Bobby's 279 Beats Record

Stranahan's Hot 66 Proves to Be Futile

TROON, Scotland, July 7 (AP)—Bobby Locke, walking as if the Troon fairways were carpeted with eggs, came up with a fourth round 68 today that won him the British Open Golf title for the second straight year and lowered a scoring mark that had stood since 1932.

The South African, widely known in the U. S. golfing circles, finished with a 279 on rounds of 69-72-70-68 over the par 70 course. His aggregate wiped out the previous low winning total of 283 posted by Gene Sarazen 18 years ago.

Only because it retained the championship for Locke did his hot round overshadow a sensational 66 which Frank Stranahan, of Toledo, Ohio, fired in a vain attempt to place the Open trophy beside the British amateur award he won earlier this spring.

Stranahan finished with 286, the best of the three-man U. S. contingent. The Toledo musclemann "lost" the title chance in the very first round when he needed 77 strokes to tour the tiny fairways of this 6,583 yard layout on the seacoast where par is 70.

Johnny Bulla of Pittsburgh, wound up with 288 and Jimmy McHale of Philadelphia, posted 290.

Stranahan's card showed rounds of 77-70-73-66 while Bulla did 73-70-71-74. McHale's four efforts were 73-73-74-70. The Ohioan's total deadlocked in a three-way tie for ninth place but gave him amateur honors. Bulla shared fourteenth place and McHale tied for seventeenth.

Behind Locke came Roberto de Vincenzo of Argentina, who carded a 281 and also broke Sarazen's record.

Antelope Hunt Held Probable

PORTLAND, July 7 (AP)—The possibility of a limited season on buck antelope appears to be good, the Oregon game commission said today.

A limited season has been tentatively for Aug. 19-25 inclusive.

Because hunting regulations won't be made final until July 25, only about three weeks before the tentative antelope season opening, the commission decided to accept applications for tags.

A drawing will be held if applications exceed the number of tags to be issued.

OSLO, July 7 (AP)—America's touring athletes again dominated the international track and field meet with Scandinavian foes today. The top events were the javelin and high jump, both captured by United States representatives. Bill Miller of Arizona State won the javelin at 226 feet, 8 3/4 inches. Dave Albritton of Dayton, Ohio, took the high jump with a leap of 6 feet, 5 inches. Jim Fuchs of Yale accounted for both the discus and shotput events. The big fellow won the discus with a toss of 159 feet, 1 1/2 inches and the shotput with a heave of 56 feet, 8 3/4 inches. Penn State's Jim Gherdes was easily best in the 110-meters hurdles. He was clocked in 14.3 seconds.
