

Joseph Sends Flying Party To Visit Salem

Ranchers, "cowgirls" and businessmen of Joseph, Ore., paid Salem a flying visit Friday in promotion of the forthcoming Chief Joseph days rodeo and celebration at the northeastern Oregon ranch town.

The 25 from Joseph were welcomed by Gov. Douglas McKay and Salem civic leaders as they took mid-morning breakfast with a Salem Chamber of Commerce group at the Senator hotel immediately following their arrival by chartered plane at the Salem airport.

Prominent among the visitors was movie star Walter Brennan, winner of three Oscars as a character actor. When not in Hollywood, Brennan is a rancher and businessman of the Joseph area.

Boosters for the Joseph celebration of July 28-30 represented the Joseph Flying Chamber of Commerce, an organization of 180 members in the town of 663 population.

They brought the celebration queen, young Jackie McFetridge, with her three princesses. Queen Jackie was greeted by Salem's Cherryland Queen Nancy Miller. Clair Brown, Salem chamber president, was master of ceremonies.

Brown, the governor and Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry were awarded honorary memberships in the Joseph flying group. The Joseph party left here for Eugene, Bend, Redmond and LaGrande before returning home. They had visited Washington and Oregon cities Thursday.

Loggers to Guard Against Trespassers

Warning to loggers cutting timber on state forests and operators to guard against trespass and prevent harvesting of timber not authorized under their contracts was issued by the state forestry department Friday.

"With pressure to increase production and highest stumpage prices in history there is a tendency to slack up on checking cutting lines and correct location of the timber included in the contracts with the state," said Homer Lyon, Jr., forestry department director.

Lyon warned that trespass damages run high with innocent or unintentional violations subject to settlement under a double stumpage value basis and willful and intentional trespass subject to treble damages. Both trespass provisions are covered by the forest laws and are being rigidly enforced, the forester averred.

Swearingen to Head Group on Reapportionment

Marshall Swearingen has been elected chairman of the bi-partisan committee for balance reapportionment, the committee announced Friday. The group is sponsoring a ballot proposal for redistricting the state legislature.

Rumors, Facts Help Topple Stock Market

NEW YORK, July 7 (AP)—Rumors, later backed by a few facts, knocked down stock prices today. Final prices showed losses running to an extreme of more than \$4 a share. Most declines were limited to around \$2 a share or less.

Sugar stocks showed independent strength, closing with gains ranging to around \$1 a share. Radio-television shares took the sharpest losses.

Neither the selling or volume of business could be compared with last week's savage liquidation but offerings of stock came in fast enough to rough up the market. Final prices were at or near the lows for the session.

Sales of 1,870,000 shares were the highest for the week. This was more a measure of quiet markets earlier in the week rather than a sign of large scale activity. Business Thursday totaled 1,570,000 shares.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined 8 of one point to 73.4, a drop which all but erased the labored advances of Wednesday and Thursday.

Grain Market Prices High

CHICAGO, July 7 (AP)—A session of nervous trading ended with prices above the previous close. This demand soon faded and the market dragged along to its confused close.

The buying spurt followed news an important military announcement would be made in the afternoon. This came after the market closed. It was a government order to use the draft law to bring military forces to needed strength for the Korean war.

Wheat closed 1/4-1/2 lower, corn 1/2 lower to 3/4 higher, oats 3/4 lower to 1/2 higher, rye 1/4-1/2 higher, soybeans 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher and lard 5 to 10 cents a hundred pounds lower.
