## PITA Zone Meet Champs Crowned as Shoot Ends

### Keebler Cops Handicap Win

Championships of the 1950 Pacific International Trapshooting association's Western Zone meet were taken down at Salem Gun club Sunday as the three-day shotgun tournament drew to its noisy finish. A total of 131 shooters banged away at the sailing targets against what was considered a "tough background" in Sunday's Handicap and Doubles championships.

Don Keebler of Albany, with 95 hits in 100 shots from the 21-yard line, won the big Handicap. Fourteen-year-old Dave Neilling of Stayton, the hit of the three-day tournament with his veteran-like coolness while under pressure, tied with George E. Henton of Portland and Harry Hanson of Eugene for second place at 92. Then in the shootoff young Neilling, stationed at the 18-yard line, cracked down 24 of 25 to Henton's 23x25 and Hanson's 20x25.

The kid won a fine ovation from the large crowd for his sparkling feat. He's the son of Chris Neilling, veteran Stayton shooter. Young Neilling also took home the meet's Junior Championship.

Donald Peters of Sublimity, with 91 out of 100, took the doubles championship Sunday, nosing out L. S. Jordan of Oregon City by one "bird."

Although he was defeated in shootoffs both Friday and Saturday for the singles and preliminary handicap titles, Stanley Brock of Walla Walla emerged all-around meet champion and high-on-all-targets finalist with 369x400 for the former and 559x600 for the latter.

Other meet champs are Bob Bliff of Independence, Class A; Leo Rickard of Cottage Grove, Class B; Howard Budlong of Portland, Class C; George Eilers of Portland, Class D; Ed Dearing of Portland, preliminary handicap, with Brock the runnerup; Gordon Miller of Eugene, Western Zone Singles, of Eugene runnerup, and Barbara Henton of Portland, Women's division. All received handsome trophies.

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### Aussies Eye Tennis Crown

WIMBLEDON, England, July 9 (AP)—The United States produced a surprise winner of the Wimbledon tennis singles championships but the Australians are confident they are going to win the Davis cup away from the Americans.

The Australians, in the charge of non-playing Captain Harry Hopman, are en route to Canada for their cup matches at Montreal this weekend.

U.S. players took the cup away from Australia when competition was resumed after the war and only those two nations have played in the challenge round since.

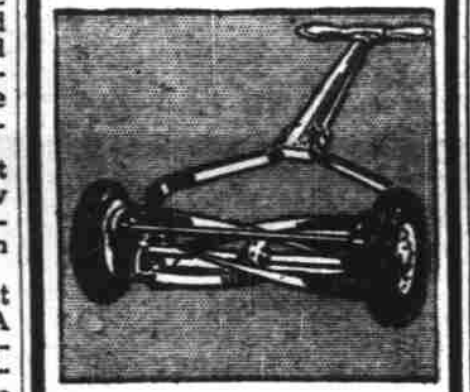
On the basis of Wimbledon form, Hopman picked a four-man team for the Canadian match—Frank Sedgman, beaten in the finals here by Budge Patty of Los Angeles; Ken McGregor, beaten in the fourth round by Jaroslav Drobný; Mervyn Rose, beaten in the third round by fellow Australian Billy Sidwell, and the veteran Jack Bromwich who lost in the fourth round to Vic Seixas of Philadelphia.

"I'm especially happy with the way Sedgman played," Hopman said. "I know that he was well beaten by Patty in the final Friday, but he's young and has lots of time to win this tournament. It showed me, though, that his wrist is well again. I think he did especially well in view of his inactivity after he was hurt."
