

Corn Forecast Assures U.S. Can Step Up Meat and Dairy Output for Military Needs

WASHINGTON, July 11—(AP)—An official forecast of a 3,175,000-bushel corn crop, the fifth largest on record, gave assurance today that the United States can step up its meat, dairy and poultry output if the military situation should demand.

The corn harvest forecast by the agriculture department in its first comprehensive crop report of the season is one-fifth larger than the government recommended last December under an acreage allotment program designed to keep grain surpluses from becoming larger.

Supplementing the corn as livestock feed are larger than average crops of oats, barley, grain sorghums and hay.

In total, this year's prospective volume of all crops is considerably smaller than that of the last two years.

The reduction reflects effects of government acreage control programs for corn, wheat, cotton, tobacco, peanuts and potatoes.

Nevertheless, the indicated volume is larger than that in five of the last eight years and much larger than any year prior to 1942.

Total farm plantings were about 357,000,000 acres, or about 13,000,000 less than last year. Much of this reduction was in cotton.

Wheat prospects picked up about 12,000,000 bushels from the 944,000,000 forecast a month ago. Such a crop might be about 56,000,000 short of needs, but the country has ample reserves from past years to make up the deficit.

The report indicated a potato surplus problem this year almost as serious as last year's forecast at 390,000,000 bushels, or 11,000,000 below last year, but about 65,000,000 more than needed.

Fruit production may be about 11 per cent below last year and four per cent less than average, reflecting unfavorable weather during the blooming season.

The tonnage of commercial truck crops for fresh markets during the summer is expected to be about the same as last summer. Production of truck crops for processing may be about six per cent less than last year.

Bids Will Be Called Soon For Schools

Bids will be called next month for additions to Richmond, Highland and McKinley schools. Work to begin this fall, the Salem school board decided Tuesday night.

Final approval was given McKinley expansion plans and instructions were presented to school architects for planning the other school additions. Bidding dates were set at August 8 for the McKinley project and August 22 for the other two. All three additions are to be ready for occupancy by the start of school in the fall of 1951.

Each of the three schools will get a modern multi-purpose room which serves as cafeteria, auditorium and recreation area.

McKinley will get four additional classrooms, Highland six and Richmond either two or four (Alternate bids will be taken on the latter.) Additional toilets are included at all schools.

At McKinley the classrooms and multi-purpose room will form single story wings at either end of the building, and the roof lines of the present building will be altered to suit the new architecture.

At Highland the addition will be identical to the recently built addition at Englewood school. Highland and Englewood were built on the same plan originally.

At Richmond the multi-purpose room will be at the north end of the building and classrooms will be added in a separate wing to the rear, separated from present classrooms by a partly covered play area.

In other action, the school board authorized use of the old Ricker school building for daytime work of the veterans agriculture program and hired Charles Fulton, the veterans agriculture teacher, to spend one-third time instructing Smith-Hughes agriculture classes which are reported increasing at Salem high school.

Highland and Englewood were built on the same plan originally. Classrooms Planned.

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Cover Crop Seed Growers Consider Uniform Price for Cleaning; 70 Attend Meet

More than 70 winter cover crop seed growers and dealers met Tuesday night at the Mayflower auditorium to learn about the new price support program and to discuss the possibility of setting a uniform seed cleaning price.

Harvey Miller, state production marketing administration chairman, explained that price support through nonrecourse farm-storage and warehouse - storage loans and through purchase agreements for all seeds listed. Applications for price support on seed must be made by producers to the office of the PMA county committee. Loans and purchase agreements will be available to producers from the time of harvest through December 31. Cooperative marketing associations of producers shall be eligible for loans and purchase agreements, Miller stated.

The commodity credit corporation which issues the price support, will not pay or assume cleaning, drying, bagging, sampling, testing, tagging or other handling or processing charges, Tate explained.

One sticker in Marion county, Tate pointed out, is that there are no approved warehouses. If storage is desired at the present time, this must be obtained outside the county. However, where seed is delivered to CCC by a dealer, freight will be refunded at the time payment for the seed is made.

John Shepherd of the seed division of the PMA in Linn county suggested that "we go ahead just like we always have. Think of the support price as the minimum price to be paid, growers trust the dealer and dealers trust the grower, and all will come out right."

Dealers present pointed out that rye grass, crimson clover and hairy vetch were now all above support price.

Both growers and dealers indicated they preferred to work the cleaning price out between themselves without the assistance of the PMA, because conditions were so variable.

Support price per 100 pounds for the 1950 cover crop seeds announced Tuesday night were: Austrian peas, \$4.52; common and Willamette vetch, \$6.57; hairy vetch, \$14.50; common rye grass, \$7.34 and crimson clover, \$16.30.

Others hired were Mrs. Betty Johnson, Independence, a former Keizer teacher; Neva Green, Portland, just graduated from Oregon College of Education, and Elaine Hansen, Portland, a 1949 Oregon State graduate who has taught in Portland's Highland school. All will be elementary teachers here.

Committee study was ordered for three items of business: Bids in various alternate forms received from Truck Sales & Service and Capital Tractor & Equipment Co. on two new school buses, ranging from \$6,500 to \$8,000; a proposal from Salem Ministerial association for use of a school auditorium for a citywide religious "crusade" November 26 to December 10, nightly; and whether to seek bids for fuel oils and gasoline this year or negotiate with present suppliers for renewal of this year's contract which several board members described as "very favorable."
