SILVERTON, July 11—(Special) The annual Oregon State Semipro baseball tournament, awarded to Silverton for the first time in years, will get under way on McGinnis field Tuesday, July 18. Local officials are now working on plans for the big meet and hope to have the full roster of entries placed into first round action soon.

Sixteen teams will be in the tourney including the top in the recent district meet at Mt. Angel. They are Roseburg, the champion, Corvallis, the runnerup and Mt. Angel and Molalla, the third and fourth place teams.

a great deal about the boy by observing his reactions under various conditions and circumstances. How does he respond? How does he behave in a crisis? Under pressure?

"When you finally decide, after watching him under various conditions, that the boy has the makings of a good ball player, you take him up. You sign him to a contract and, having vouched for his future, you undertake to coach him, nurse him along, instruct him, guide him. You look after his personal welfare as well as his baseball development. You appoint yourself his guardian. His success is your success and you can never let him down."

Background of Successful Scout

How about Egan's baseball background? What experience did he have? How did he become a scout? These questions elicited the following biographical facts:

Egan was born at Ewart, Mich., a very small town that is near Baldwin, Mich., another very small town where the residents shoot deer from their back porches during the season, a town made more or less known by a man named Hank Hefterman, a Hollywood figure whose columns on the cinema great and near-great are syndicated in many newspapers.

When Aloysius was six months old the family moved to Detroit. His father worked for the government. When he was 16 years old, Aloysius joined a shop team, known as the Michigan Alkali, as a righthanded pitcher. He also got a job as a reward for pitching every Saturday. That was in 1901.

In 1902, Aloysius, who by this time was known by the simpler name of Wish, continued working and pitching for Michigan Alkali. A man approached him one day in early September and told him that Frank Dwyer wanted to see him at Bennett Park.

Dwyer was the manager of the Detroit Tigers and Bennett Park was the club's home field. Wish hurried to Bennett Park, introduced himself to Dwyer and signed a Tiger contract.

Wish finished the season with Detroit and the next year the Tigers sent him to Louisville under a gentlemen's agreement to gain further experience. He set a new record for assists by a pitcher, but after the season something went wrong with the gentlemen's agreement. The Tigers lost title to him and Louisville sold him to the Cardinals, managed at that time by Charles (Kid) Nichols, one of the all-time greats among pitchers.

Egan remained with the Cardinals until 1906, when his arm became sore, and they sent him to Kansas City. His arm failed to respond to treatment and he jumped to the outlaw league in California. After a stretch of outlaw ball, he came back east and joined Joe McGinnity at Newark. At midseason the next year he was released and turned to umpiring in the Central League.

Wish must have been a very good umpire, since Ban Johnson offered him a job in the American League. However, before he could report, Mrs. Egan became very ill and he had to remain at home. He umpired local games on Saturday, and University of Michigan games at Ann Arbor, but that is as far as he ever got from home.

While he was officiating games in and near Detroit, Egan began studying players, evaluating their possibilities, and that is how he got started on scouting. His judgment was good from the beginning and it continued improving and within a few years he was the most highly regarded hunter of raw talent in the Detroit organization. He has held that distinction ever since.

The crowd roared with Jansen as he mowed down the American "sluggers" from the seventh through the 11th. He whiffed two each in the seventh, eighth and ninth including Larry Doby, of Cleveland, George Kell, of Detroit and Ted Williams of Boston.

Jansen's work followed in the same pattern as Konstanty who fanned Hoot Evers and Jim Hegan in the hitless sixth, his only inning. Then after Jansen did his job, Blackwell continued to bamboozle the losers with his baffling side arm stuff.

The excited crowd that paid a record of \$126,179 to sit in the bright sun around Comiskey's green acre, saw a battle that will be discussed as long as all-star games are played.

Few will forget the curling smash by Schoendienst on a 1-2 pitch, that landed in the front row of the seats in the upper left field stands, about 375 feet away.

Schoendienst, normally no slugger with only three homers to his credit all season, is a switch hitter. Against the lefthanded Gray, only southpaw in the game, he hit righthanded.

When the slender 27-year-old St. Louis Cardinal second baseman raced home, the whole National league bench was up to greet him. So were most of the paying customers who had two chances for the traditional stretch in the seventh and 14th innings—in this 3-hour-19 minutes marathon struggle.

Enos Slaughter of St. Louis started the Nats on their way after Brooklyn's Jackie Robinson grounded a single to right in the second. The 34-year-old slauter, playing his seventh all-star game, tripled off the wall in left center, scoring Robby. Slaughter scored on Sauer's fly to right fielder Hoot Evers.
