A Cold Shiver

Citrus Fruit Beverages World's No. 1 Cool Drink; Lemonade Sounds Cold

Somehow even the sound of "lemonade" is cool and refreshing. The citrus people provide us with some mighty good suggestions for using their product—why shouldn't they, it is their business. But on the other hand we welcome some good summertime ideas. Here's their idea of:

FROSTED LEMONADE
2 cups sugar
2 1/2 cups water
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
Cook the sugar with the water for 5 minutes, cool. Add other ingredients and let steep for 15 minutes or so, then strain into a jar. Cover and keep in refrigerator until ready to serve. Use 1/2 cup of the mixture for each tall glass, fill up with ice and water and garnish with mint and slices of lemon.

TEA LEMONADE
2 teaspoons tea
5 1/2 cups water
Boil 5 cups of the water and pour over the tea leaves and let steep 5 minutes. Strain and cool. Make syrup of the remaining water and sugar, boiling for about 10 minutes. Add to tea, then add lemon juice and serve very cold. Makes two quarts. But oranges, too, have that chilly sound and fresh flavor for family drinking on a warm day. Here are several suggestions.

ORANGEADE
3 cups orange juice
3 cups cold water
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Combine fresh orange juice and sugar in the pitcher and stir to dissolve the sugar. Add water and lemon juice and pour into tall glasses. Top with orange slices.

ORANGE EGG NOG
Combine one egg, 1 tablespoon honey or sugar, one cup orange juice and beat well. This makes one large or two small glasses. The experts suggest a new idea (to us) for ice cubes. Fill the ice cube trays 1/2 full of water, in each place a 1/2 or 3/4 slice of orange or lemon and a sprig of mint and freeze, fill up with water and freeze again.

Another really fancy idea is to peel whole oranges around and around with a sharp knife, and then twist each around inside the glass in which is put the beverage. Use the orange, of course, for juice.
