

Truman Asks Fund In Drive To Tell Truth

WASHINGTON, July 13—(AP)—President Truman asked congress today for \$125,645,000 to wage an intense "campaign of truth," aimed principally at "critical" countries of Europe and Asia.

One aim is to crash the Soviet radio jamming screen with a more powerful voice of America and to reach remote areas.

"We will never attain real security until people everywhere recognize that the free nations of the world are the true seekers of permanent peace," the president said in a letter to House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tenn.).

Korea Envoy Says Commie Drive 'Failed'

HARRISBURG, Pa., July 13—(AP)—Dr. John M. Chang, South Korea ambassador to the United States, declared tonight that "regardless of the present course of battle, the communist attempt in Korea has already failed."

"The communists were aiming for quick victory — success so sudden and so complete that neither the United Nations nor the United States would have time to intervene," Dr. Chang said.

"With courageous and clear-sighted firmness the American government and the United Nations security council reacted to the challenge," he said noting that within 15 hours the United Nations had acted and the United States had started military supplies to Korea.

Convict Faces Murder Count In Oregon City

OREGON CITY, July 13—(AP)—Wayne Long, 26, wounded in a Portland bank robbery June 15, was indicted on a charge of first degree murder by a grand jury today.

He is accused in the death of a Portland carpenter, Walter Rucker, 28, who was found shot to death near Estacada, a few hours after long was shot down in a gunfight with FBI agents as he left a branch of the First National bank in Portland with more than \$8500.

Long had used a truck belonging to Rucker in the robbery. He also was indicted today on a charge of assault and robbery armed with a dangerous weapon.

Long, just released from the Oregon state penitentiary, is also facing federal grand jury action on charges of bank robbery and assaulting a federal officer. Leonard Frank, an FBI agent, was wounded seven times in the fight with long but is recovering.

District Attorney Leonard Lindas of Clackamas county said Long probably would be tried on federal charges first.

North Korea Promises to Quit Atrocities

LAKE SUCCESS, July 13—(AP)—The U. N.-sponsored republic of Korea and the communist North Korean regime both have promised to observe the Geneva conventions against atrocities, reports received at the U. N. said today.

The South Korean republic officially said its soldiers are strictly carrying out the government's order to adhere to the Geneva conventions. This replied to an appeal from U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie that both sides observe the rules of warfare.

The Pyongyang radio announced in a broadcast heard in Tokyo that North Korea is sending Lie a message agreeing to comply with his request to treat prisoners humanely. The official text has not yet reached Lake Success.

Pleven's New Cabinet Given Nod 335-224

PARIS, July 13—(AP)—The French national assembly approved Premier Rene Pleven's new cabinet 335 to 224 today, ending a political crisis that began June 24.

Communists and DeGaullists formed the core of the opposition to Pleven's choices, which restored the socialist party to the government coalition it left last February.

The crisis began when Premier George Bidault's cabinet was forced out June 24. Henri Queuille took over the premiership, but resigned when he lost his first test, July 4 in the assembly, 336 to 221.

Bumper Field Crops Outlook For Oregon

PORTLAND, July 13—(AP)—The federal crop forecaster here today predicted a bumper harvest for the main field crops in Oregon.

Niels L. Nielsen, the forecaster, said timely rains in June improved most crops.

He estimated the wheat crops at 23,632,000 bushels, slightly more than last year. Barley will total 14,318,000 bushels, a 38 per cent increase over last year, he said. Oats, however, will be down 4 per cent to a total of 10,626,000 bushels.

The hay crop is expected to be up 11 per cent from last year; potatoes only slightly under the 1949 figure—11,310,000 bushels compared with 11,890,000 last year.

Tree fruit production will be the smallest in many years, about 18 per cent under average, Nielsen said. Sweet cherries are expected to total 18,000 tons, about 9 per cent under average, and sour cherries 2000 tons, about average.

Cut In Road Funds Beaten In Senate Vote

WASHINGTON, July 13—(AP)—The senate late today decisively beat down an attempt by Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) to slash \$100,000,000 off a \$385,000,000 appropriation for federal aid for highways.

Go Ahead, Rita's Husband Says In Regard to Films

ROME, July 13—(AP)—Rita Hayworth may return soon to screen work, Il Tempo reported today.

The newspaper said that film Director King Vidor, travelling with Prince Ali Khan and his wife, is trying to persuade her to make a new film under his direction.

The newspaper quoted the prince as saying "my wife is free to do as she likes in this field and she can return to the studios whenever she wants."

Sheriff Heads Defense Unit In Multnomah

PORTLAND, July 13—(AP)—Multnomah county set up a civil defense agency today.

Sheriff Terry D. Schunk was named director.

County commissioners said in a statement: "The present war in Korea and our close air proximity to hostile forces threatens the ever increasing possibility of disasters resulting from enemy attack, sabotage or other hostile action."

Board members will include Mrs. E. J. Bell, Stayton, Ore.

A ritualistic demonstration and a brief business meeting tomorrow will conclude the 23rd biennial convention of the organization.

Hay Feverers Will Just Have To Stay Home

OREGON CITY, July 13—(AP)—Federal, state and county officials apparently decided today to take no action against the only known patch of ragweed in the state.

It is a 50-acre patch near Estacada, viewed on an inspection trip today by representatives from the county agent's office, the county health office and the county court.

All pleaded lack of funds to deal with the weed, the scourge of hay fever victims.

There was some opinion that the weed is no threat in Oregon. The patch is known to be more than 15 years old, yet apparently has not spread beyond its present area.

J. W. Sparks Dies at Home; Rites Pending

Joseph Wesley Sparks, 73, an employee of the California Packing company in Salem for the past eight years, died of a heart attack Thursday at his home at 1065 N. 14th st.

Sparks was born July 10, 1877, in Indiana and lived most of his life in Nebraska where he was married Sept. 14, 1904, to Della Blodgett, who survives in Salem. The couple moved here about eight years ago.

Also surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Inez Shaver, Salem; two sons, Mrs. Pamela Craig and Mrs. Luella Rossiter, both of Beatrice, Neb.; five brothers, S. D. and Alvin Sparks, both of Beatrice, Charles and Granbil Sparks, both of North Platte, Neb., and Murrell Sparks, First View, Colo.; three grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be arranged by the Clough-Barrick chapel.

Yep! Officers Really Go On Kitchen Police

FORT LEWIS, Wash., July 13—(AP)—Enlisted men thought it was a sight for sore eyes. The officers merely grinned wryly and went about their tasks.

The tasks? Kitchen police and latrine duty.

The officers are members of California's 91st infantry division reserve. When the second infantry division was alerted for overseas it could no longer supply housekeeping troops nor act as a training support unit for the 175th men assembled here with the 91st.

So the fire three division officers, 85 per cent of them combat veterans, took on the housekeeping duties to give the enlisted reservists more time for training.

Brig. Gen. C. Lyn Fox, commanding general of the 91st and in civilian life the political editor of the San Francisco Call-Bulletin, said the two-week summer camp will end July 22.

The division is the west's largest single reserve unit. It's total strength is 2,200 men.

Tot Found Dead Near Tavern; One Suspect Arrested

LOUISVILLE, Ky., July 13—(AP)—Three-year-old Joyce Joan Shouse was found dead under a loading dock today, just a few yards from the tavern from which she disappeared last Friday night while her mother was drinking with a man friend.

Coroner George F. Dwyer reported a preliminary examination indicated the tiny tot had been raped.

Oklahoma city police arrested J. E. Herington, 47, Oklahoma City, for vagrancy and questioned him about the girl's death.

Ute Indians Strike It Rich In Court — Win \$31,700,000 Claim

WASHINGTON, July 13—(AP)—The Ute Indians of Colorado and Utah struck it rich today.

The Utes—mostly poor, uneducated farmers—won a record-breaking \$31,700,000 claim against the government.

This amount represents about \$10,000 for each Ute as payment for the 6,000,000 acres of land the U.S. took from his ancestors.

The court of claims handed down four judgments. One of these was for \$24,296,127, which lawyers say is the biggest judgment ever handed down against the government. The three other judgments pushed the total up to \$31,700,000.

Ernest Wilkinson, attorney for the Utes, told a reporter that the largest previous total was awarded only a couple of months ago. It, too, went to Indians — \$17,000,000 to the Tillamooks on the west coast.

The Utes have had their share of troubles with the white man's ways.

The started out dandy, with 15,000,000 acres set aside for them in 1868. But after gold was discovered in Colorado, they sold back 4,000,000 acres—at 17 cents an acre.

Despite the court's ruling, they

can't get their cash until congress votes it.

But the Utes can wait. By now, they should be used to it.
