

Tierney Downed; Soriano Shines in Relief

PARKER FIELD, Yakima, July 18-(Special)-The Yakima Bears tonight trounced the Salem Sen-ators 12-4 in the opening game of their Western International league baseball series here, thus ending a four-game winning streak by the Oregonians. A big five run inning in the fifth on five hits, including Bill Andring's second triple of the game,
