Suit Challenges City Engineer Building Order

Owners of the Oregon building in downtown Salem Wednesday filed suit against the City of Salem protesting orders from the city engineer's office to install fire-prevention devices in quarters under lease to the Pay-Less Drug Co.

The complaint, filed by Hawkins & Roberts Building Corp., also seeks a restraining order permitting the drug store to open and operate until a verdict is handed down.

The complaint states that plaintiffs were directed to install a sprinkler system in the basement or to enclose the front stairs leading from the first floor to the basement with one-hour fire doors.

It states that a city building permit for \$8,000 alterations to the store was issued to the Pay-Less Drug Co. on May 16, with the notation that it was subject to complete installation of a basement sprinkler system.

The complaint alleges that this requirement is without authority of law under the uniform building code adopted by the city council in June, 1946.

The complaint states that the basement has two stairways, a plastered ceiling and that the same premises formerly were used by another retail firm for the sale of merchandise.

4 Salem Men Join Air Force

Newcastle Disease Vaccine for State Flocks Unplanned

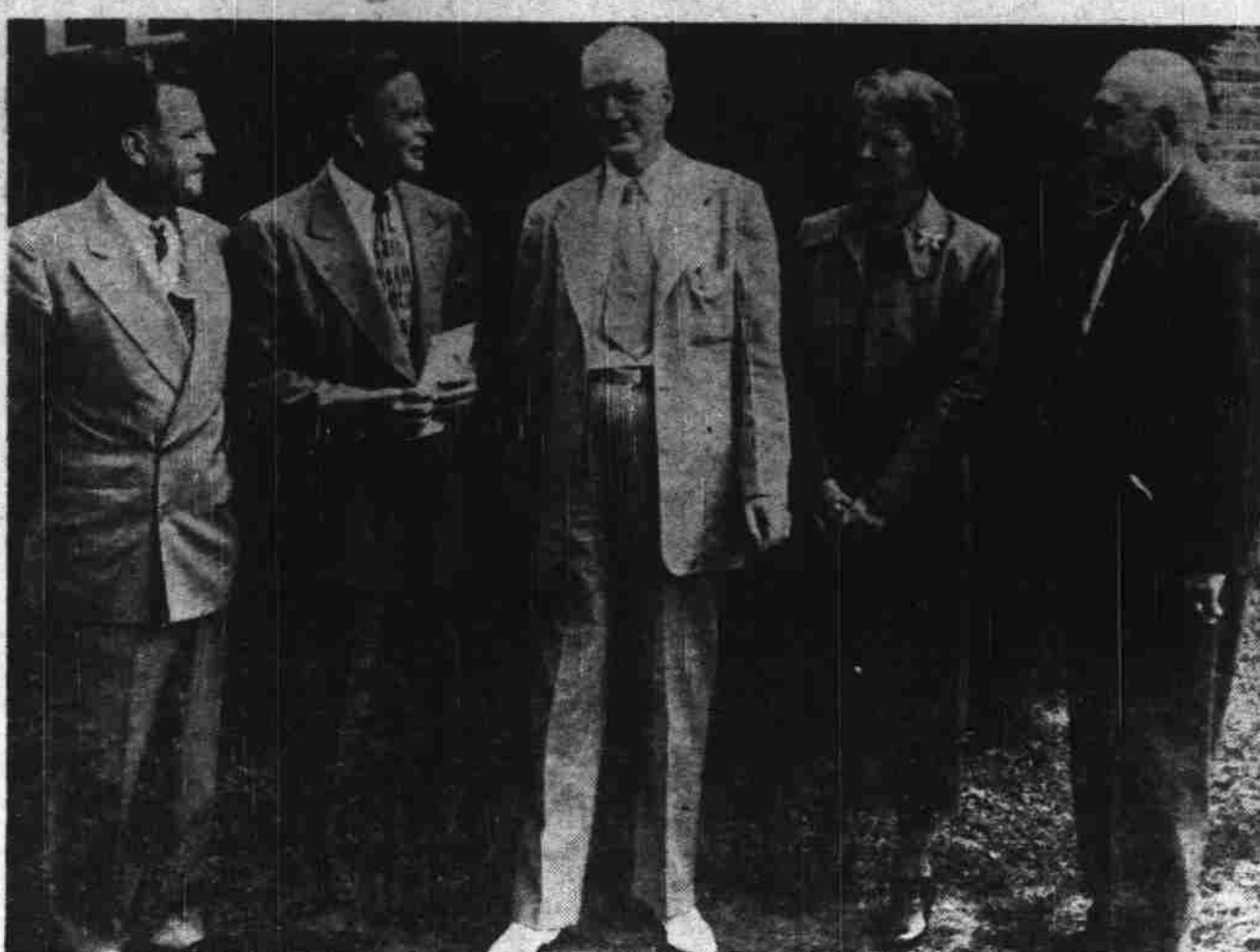
There will be no wholesale vaccination of Oregon poultry flocks for Newcastle disease, Dr. R. R. Younce, state veterinarian, announced Wednesday.

He emphasized that basic sanitary precautions are much more important in the control of Newcastle disease in Oregon flocks than wholesale vaccination with live virus vaccine.

Dr. Younce warned flock owners to stay away from flocks suspected of an acute outbreak of Newcastle disease and flocks recently vaccinated because the danger of contagion is at its peak at these times.

He said Newcastle disease has been less of a problem in Oregon than in most other states.

EUGENE, July 19 — (Special) — Gov. Douglas McKay and his color guard will lead a giant four-mile-long pioneer and industrial parade Thursday, July 27, as this city presents its seventh Oregon Trail pageant.

Mrs. W. L. Van Duren, Jefferson, who won world-wide fame as "Klondike Kate" at the turn of the century, will also ride in the parade which will wind through Eugene streets the second day of the four-day festival.

Portland will be represented by "Paul Bunyan," an 8-foot 6-inch attorney who claims he is the world's biggest lawyer — and one of the world's most mammoth men.

Organizations from many other cities in the northwest will also be on hand to help Eugene honor the pioneers who came west on the Oregon trail a century ago.

Oregon Wages Maintain High National Rate

After leading the nation in hourly and weekly earnings in April, Oregon's production workers established even higher marks in May, according to reports from 400 manufacturers to the state unemployment compensation commission.

Production workers earned \$1.78 an hour and \$69.47 a week in May, as compared with \$1.75 an hour and \$68.79 in April. Both figures were well above previous highs of last December and were slightly above comparable totals from other states.

In second and third places were Michigan with \$68.47 and Wyoming with \$67.47, while Washington and California followed at \$66.93 and \$62.94 a week. For the entire nation \$56.93 was the average weekly rate with durable goods at \$61.12 and non-durables \$52.17.

With lumber and logging earnings setting a new high of \$73.33, Oregon's durable goods workers received more than ever before at \$71.92 a week. A higher hourly scale for union mill workers was only partially reflected in May reports, while average hours in planing mills and plywood plants dropped from 43.6 to 43.1 a week, reflecting less overtime during the month.

Workers in non-durable goods also recorded a new high of \$60.94 with printing and publishing employees advancing sharply from \$78.16 to \$83.27, mainly because of a new hourly rate averaging \$2.33. A shorter work week in one mill and fewer orders resulted in paper products workers earnings dropping from \$69.32 to \$66.66.
