Chilled Clear Through

Summer Food Designed to Provide Coolness to Cook as Well as Diners

With a cool breeze blowing in the office window and the sky outside overcast, we take typewriter in hand to discuss hot weather food. Ice tea, the experts tell us, is extra good when a few sprigs of mint are put in while the tea is being steeped. A lemon slice, into which has been thrust another sprig of mint, is used for garnishing.

A flavor-filled way to use up pieces of leftover bread is this: Cut the bread in cubes, fry in garlic-flavored butter or bacon fat and toss with the green salad just as it's ready to serve.

A good patio dinner dish is a grilled French toast sandwich. Dip regular cheese sandwiches in a combination of beaten eggs, milk and salt and brown on both sides in hot fat.

Here's a new one to us, but sounds like one the children (large and small) will smack their lips over. Place 2 graham crackers, a generous scoop of chocolate ice cream and a cup of milk on the beater bowl. Turn the beater on low and let stir for a minute. Serve in a glass.

They're doing a lot with this ready-made sherbet mix one of the well known food manufacturers are putting out. For instance, here is a dessert called

GINGERY ORANGE PIE

28 ginger snaps 1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup butter Mixed orange sherbet

Roll out cookies and blend crumbs with sugar and melted butter. Pour mixture into 9-inch pie tin and press firmly into an even layer against sides of plate. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for about 8 minutes. Chill.

Make one recipe of the ready mixed orange sherbet, using one package, and 2 cups milk or water. Freeze, then remove from freezer and whip. Freeze again and when ready to serve, pile into ginger crust and cut in wedges to serve.

Then there's the smoked picnic, the lower half of the shoulder, which is treated the same as a ham, but makes a less expensive roast for a smaller family and is good for outdoor meals.

If to be cooked in liquid, place the picnic in a heavy utensil and completely cover with water. Cover and allow to simmer 35 to 45 minutes per pound. Half an hour before done, remove from water, place on a rack and open roast in a pan. To glaze, combine 1/4 cup flour, 1/4 cup brown sugar and just enough vinegar to make a paste. Spread mixture over picnic and stick with cloves. Put in oven to glaze.

In roasting a picnic, place flat side up on a rack in open pan. Add no water or cover, roast at 300 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes per pound.

Stored tightly in your refrigerator, smoked picnic has numerous uses to make mealtime simple. For instance, slices may be heated over a potato casserole. For a cooling combination, the meat may be cut into bite-size cubes and tossed with orange sections, chopped celery and mayonnaise.



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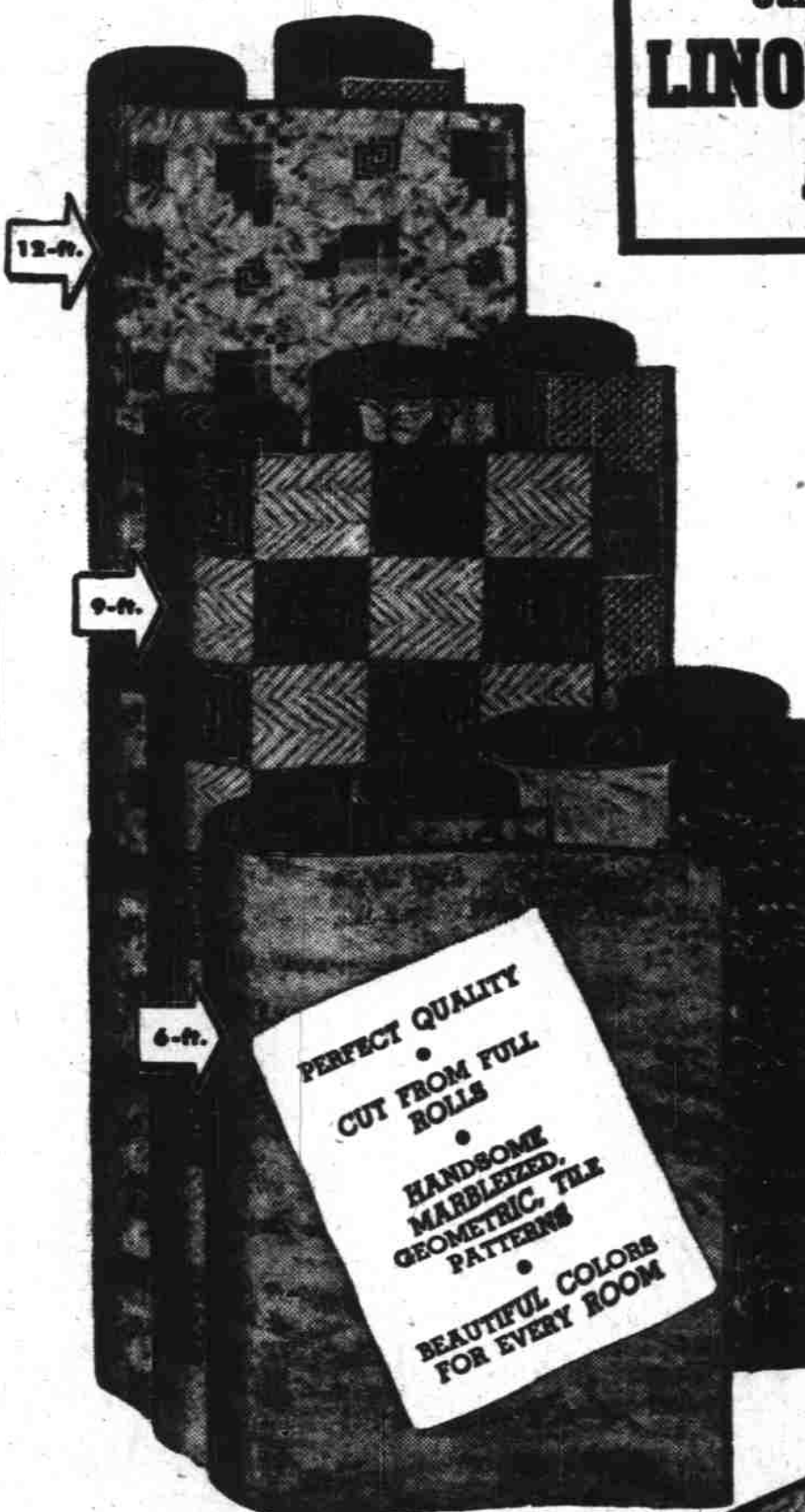
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
