Aug. 14 Final Day for Filing For November

The state elections bureau warned Friday that August 14 is the final date on which independent candidates for office at the November election may file certificates.

Affirmative arguments involving measures on the November ballot must be filed by August 9 and negative arguments by August 24. Candidates have until August 29 to file statements.

The arguments, both affirmative and negative, will appear in the voters' pamphlet to be printed and circulated prior to the general election.

Independent candidates may be selected either by an assembly of 150 voters or by petition. For statewide offices petitions must contain signatures of three per cent of the voters at a previous election or a total of 15,722.

72 Compete for Top Honor in Manbrin Gardens Community Landscaping Contest Sunday

If you want to go riding and don't know where to go Sunday, take a drive out to Manbrin Gardens community. There is a garden contest going on there with judging to start at 9 p.m. The winning gardens will be wearing ribbons on their front posts as soon as the judging is completed. This is expected to be about 4:30 p.m.

To reach Manbrin Gardens, you follow North Commercial street out to the Keizer road. Just before you come to Keizer, a well-designed sign points to the Gardens, which is a suburb to Salem to the left.

Last year, Manbrin Gardens Community club started its annual garden contest. Then only a few participated. But the event, though small, proved so successful that this year 72 gardens are taking part, according to the president, Fred Gast. Members of the Men's Garden club of Salem are the judges.

Since early spring, gardeners in this area have been busy grooming their lawns and gardens and visitors have found this a most pleasant place for a Sunday afternoon drive.

There are four divisions in the contest being held this year with prizes offered in each.

First division is judged from general appearance of home and landscape as it appears from the street. The second division pays out for the most beautiful front lawn. In the third division (which is mostly for the judges and not for the public as a whole) deals with appearance and arrangement of the back lawn. The final division deals with arrangement, appearance and quality of the vegetable garden.

No one of the homes which are competing will be eligible for more than one prize.

Drunk Driving Convictions Showing Gains

Drunken driving convictions in Oregon during the first six months of 1950 increased 22 per cent over the corresponding period last year, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry announced Friday.

There were 1,103 licenses revoked for driving while intoxicated during the six months of 1950. Last year during the same period there were 907 revocations for drunken driving.

A total of 19,168 traffic violation convictions, resulting in revocation of 1,340 licenses and suspension of 252 other licenses, were reported for January through June of this year.

Reckless driving, violation of the basic rule and other serious traffic offenses led to 248 suspension, which were issued upon recommendation of the courts.

Over-all convictions resulted in only a six per cent increase over last year when 18,124 convictions were reported by Newbry's office.
