Korean Crisis, Draft Threatens Major Stars

NEW YORK, July 21-(P)-The deepening crisis in Korea threatened today to call some of the major league's brightest young stars to service in the armed forces.

Both the American and National league races could be affected vitally by selective service action or the summons of reserves to active duty.

Curt Simmons, pitching ace of the Philadelphia Phillies in the National league, will do two weeks of national guard duty in August. Whether this might be extended depends on decisions in Washington.

7 Speedboats In Gold Race

'My Sweetie' Out To Defend Title

DETROIT, July 21-(P)-A field of at least seven speedboats was assured tonight for the 43rd running tomorrow of the Gold Cup racing classic on the Detroit river.

Never in its long history has the event been beset with as many question marks as this 1950 version. There are questions of boats, of pilots, of the course and of the size of the field.

By today's actual 10 a.m. qualifying deadline only three craft had met the tests. Four others attained the minimum speed of 65 miles an hour for the nine-mile ground and thus are eligible. At least two others will have a last-ditch chance to get in the race in extended trials set for 5 to 7 a.m. tomorrow.

The field now consists of: My Sweetie, the defending champion and the top qualifier; Slo-Mo-Shum IV, the world record holder from Seattle; Tempo VI, the rebuilt entry of band leader Guy Lombardo; Such Crust II, the newer of Detroit's Jack Schaefer's "team"; Dee Jay V, a newcomer from Philadelphia; Etta, owned and driven by George Sarant of Freeport, N. Y.; Blitz III, a 225-class boat owned by Bob Bogle of Saranac Lake, N. Y.

Grid Sanity Code to Stick

MACKINAC ISLAND, Mich., July 21-(P)-Commissioners of 12 college conferences decided today against making any recommendations on revisions of the sanity code.

After reviewing problems presented by the code, the commissioners agreed they should continue their efforts to assist the NCAA on procedure.

Commissioner K. L. (Tug) Wilson of Chicago, representing the Big Ten, pointed out the group meeting here is not a policy-making body.

The council of the NCAA will meet next month to consider possible revisions in the sanity code.

Scullers Ready For Shell Test

PHILADELPHIA, July 21-(P)-Forty oarsmen from the West Side Rowing club, Buffalo, N. Y., took their shells out on the Schuylkill river today in preparation for defense of their club title in the national rowing championships starting tomorrow.

The Buffalo oarsmen are favored to retain the Julius H. Barnes trophy, won last year on their home waters. Included in the squad are a number of Columbia university varsity men.

Other entries in the single sculls include Joe McIntyre, Seattle, Wash.

Columbia Bass Wise to Anglers' Angles

RICHLAND, Wash., July 21-(P)-A bass just can't be trusted. Members of the Richland rod and gun club will swear to it. This is their story:

They knew that sloughs of the Columbia river inside the limits of the Hanford atomic plant were alive with the finny critters. But the atomic energy commission doesn't let unescorted fishermen or anyone else go fishing around the reservation. So the rod and gunners got permission from the ABC to trap and transplant the bass.

Into a fine stretch of water along the Yakima river they slid 300 big bass. Weighed, measured and marked for identification, the bass, many of them ready to spawn, presented the hope of a future crop outside the restricted area.

But you can't trust a bass. Soon after they were planted, reports came from 15 miles up the swift Columbia: bass with a clipped fin were being caught. That was the mark of the rod and gun club. What's more they hadn't even waited to spawn before starting back.

There was only one conclusion: the bass knew a reservation where fishermen weren't allowed when they saw one.

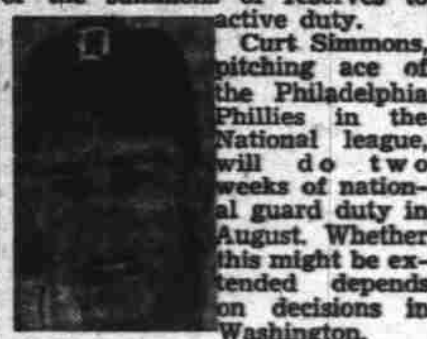
