Several members of the Salem Rotana club were elected to national office during the convention of the organization held in Bozeman, Mont., in the early part of July.

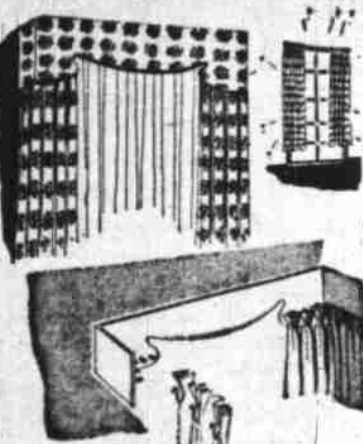

HIDE SHORTCOMINGS

When the good-as-new draperies from the old house aren't long enough for the windows in the new house you've a problem on your hands—but not one that can't be solved. Build those beautiful cornices you've always wanted. Make them deep enough to more than make up the difference between the drapery tops and the tops of the windows. Hooks on the inside of the cornices just above their lower edges will hold the draperies, one hook at each pleat cluster and at the side hems. Cover the cornices with the drapery fabric, or, if it can't be matched, with a plain colored fabric in a shade from the drapery fabric. Cornices like these add important good looks to the whole room as well as to the individual window, and you've concealed the draperies' shortcomings so well no one could guess.

Just Corn

Fresh or Canned Corn Go Into Some Unexpected Recipes, Say Flour Firms

Pancakes made from corn meal are a familiar old favorite, but what about making them from fresh corn kernels. The wheat flour manufacturer's organization has several offerings using fresh corn to submit.

If you were like us, you'd eat fresh corn only off the cob, but many persons like to vary their fare.

FRESH CORN PANCAKES
1 cup sifted flour 1 1/4 cups milk
2 teaspoons baking powder 1 cup whole-kernel corn
1/2 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons melted shortening
1 egg
Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Beat egg. Add milk, corn and shortening. Add to flour mixture and mix well. Cook on lightly greased hot griddle. Makes about 12 5-inch pancakes.

Flaky biscuits speckled with golden corn make unusual short-cake bases for creamed chicken say the wheat flour people. Add the corn, and also green pepper if you wish, to the flour and fat mixture, then proceed as in making biscuits. Corn kernels may be added to drop biscuit dough used to make dumpling to go with stewed chicken or meat stews.

GOLDEN KERNELETTES
1 cup sifted flour 1/2 cup whole kernel corn
1 1/4 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 cup milk (cooked)
1/2 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
1 to 2 tablespoons shortening
Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Cut or rub in shortening. Add corn and green pepper. Mix well. Add milk and knead 1/2 minute. Roll dough 1/4 inch thick. Cut with 3-inch biscuit cutter. Bake on ungreased baking sheet in hot oven (450 degrees) 10 minutes. Spoon creamed chicken between and over split kernelettes. Makes 4 3-inch biscuits.
