

V-2 Double Rocket Successful in First Guided Horizontal Flight

LONG RANGE PROVING GROUND, Cocoa, Fla., July 24—(AP)—A huge German V-2 rocket, carrying a smaller missile piggy-back, made a thunderous climb over the Atlantic today for the first successful horizontal flight of a guided long range missile.

It was a preview of "pushbutton" warfare at dizzying speed. The V-2 got up to 2,700 miles an hour and the smaller nose-mounted missile, called the "Wac Corporal," went even faster—perhaps 5,000 miles an hour. Its performance is a military secret.

"It was a successful flight," said Col. Harold R. Turner, safety officer and former commandant of the White Sands proving ground, New Mexico. "The trajectory was beautiful."

City to Join in McNary Field Taxiway Work

The city of Salem and federal government will join in improving the main north-south taxiway at the city airport this summer and next, under authority granted by the city council Monday night.

City Manager J. L. Franzen predicted the taxiway would not hold up another winter without reconditioning and new surfacing. He said the heavy use by DC-4 passenger planes with dual landing wheels was cracking the surface.

It was decided to join with civil aeronautics administration in an \$11,300 project this year, with the city's share to be \$5,000. Franzen said the city obligation could be financed under the current budget. Voters at a special election had turned down a millage tax proposed for general airport development, including improved taxiways.

The airport taxiway project would be continued next year, with the city budgeting \$11,595 for the work, it was indicated.

Sale of \$1,630,000 worth of bonds to finance city projects struck a snag last night, the time set for opening of bids. As a result, the council will readvertise for bids August 14.

Attracted Eastern Bidders

City Attorney Chris J. Kowitz explained that the large amount of the bond sale had attracted eastern bidders not familiar with the local practice of allowing a financial house to bid different rates of interest on various parts of the bond issue. Some of these bidders had bid a straight interest rate and then pressed Oregon bonding attorneys for a ruling that split interest bidding be allowed only if the call for bids so stated.

The council decided to readvertise under this condition, without opening the five bids on hand last night.

In other city council action last night:

Special meeting was called for 5:15 p.m. Friday to consider bids on the \$125,000 northeast drainage project, to be opened today by the city manager.

E. Finkbeiner of Portland was awarded contract for compressor and ejector equipment for the new sewage disposal plant. Its bid of \$4,058 was recommended for acceptance by John W. Cunningham consulting firm which has worked with the city in planning the disposal system.

A package beer license request from Owl Drug Co. was turned down when aldermen indicated they didn't want beer sold in drug stores.

Three bids on a city lot with small house, located on North River Road, were rejected as too low. Walter Lansing bid \$2,000; William Hall \$2,260 and Hutchinson & Danielson \$2,310.

Also rejected was an offer to purchase from the city a strip of property near D and 14th streets, now used as an alley.

Stanley Earl Resigns from Korea Mission

WASHINGTON, July 24—(AP)—Stanley Earl, former executive secretary of the Oregon state CIO council, said tonight he had resigned "as of today" as special assistant to the chief of an economic cooperation administration mission to Korea.

Earl, who was evacuated from Korea June 27, told a reporter "it is obvious that the mission to Korea is no longer functioning."

Chinese Reds Boost Quemoy Bombardment

TAIPEI, Formosa, July 24—(AP)—The Chinese Nationalists reported tonight the communists were bombarding the northeast corner of Quemoy Island and were sending junks for what might be a long-anticipated assault.

The defense ministry spokesman who made the report to newsmen said nationalist ground troops on the 50-square-mile island opposite the Red mainland, 100 miles west of Formosa, were adequate to cope with the expected attack. He said they would be supported by locally-assigned Nationalist air and naval units.

(In Washington, a state department official said the United States would not interfere if the communists tried to invade Quemoy. The official, Press Officer Michael J. McDermott, said President Truman's ban on fighting between the Chinese Nationalists and Communists applied to Formosa, Nationalist headquarters island, and the nearby Pescadore islands.)

Fire Razes Home East of Albany

ALBANY, July 24—Fire leveled the Walter Shelby residence in the Knox Butte district five miles east of Albany Monday afternoon, leaving a family of six homeless.

An overheated kitchen flu was blamed. The Shelby's lost nearly all of their possessions in the fire which was partially covered by insurance.

Three trucks from the Albany fire department responded. The fire started while Mrs. Shelby was driving to a field with dinner she had prepared for the farm hands.

Ban on Commie Seamen Wins Dual Approval

WASHINGTON, July 24—(AP)—A security system for barring communists and subversives from American ships was agreed upon today by management and unions of the maritime industry.

Under a voluntary pact, worked out under the guidance of federal officials, the coast guard will be in charge of the actual policing. Absent from the meeting and uninvited were elements of the left wing CIO longshoremen's union, headed by Harry Bridges, together with the left-wing CIO cooks and stewards union.

The statement of maritime policy issued by management and union officials attending said: "We recognize that certain men, because of being known as communist party card carriers, subversives or who are notorious as consistently carrying out policies of the communist party will be classified as bad security risks by the military or proper government authorities."

The shop operators and workers, representing all coasts and sections of the country pledged that "no shop will be delayed because any such men are rejected" as bad security risks.

Gas Explosion Burns Hand Of Salem Man

Lawrence J. Moffitt, 27, of 460 1/2 S. Capitol st., suffered third-degree burns on his left hand and arm Monday when gasoline exploded while he was unloading it from a truck at a west Salem sand and gravel company, first aidmen reported.

He was taken to a doctor's office for treatment. Workmen extinguished the fire without calling city firemen.

In other first-aid runs, Bobby Smalley, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Smalley, 3384 Fairhaven ave., was taken to Salem Memorial hospital after he broke his right arm in a bicycle spill.

Judd Pankratz, 22, of 1070 Oxford st., was treated for a cut over his right eye when he was accidentally hit with a hammer while working.
