Oriental Main Dish, Hot Sandwich Tart Apple Dessert Among Recipes

Goodness, one finds lots of fine ideas among the mail that accumulates on the desk over one of our double weekends! For instance, the wheat flour people send a monthly letter on how to use a spaghetti and macaroni in some interesting ways. Here is an orientalist dish that uses soy sauce to give it that flavor, but utilizes spaghetti instead of the rice, usually used by orientals.

ORIENTAL SUPPER DISH
1/2 pound boned lamb shoulder
3 tablespoons enriched flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons fat or drippings
2 cups hot water
1 bouillon cube
1/2 teaspoon onion salt
1/2 cup thinly sliced celery
1 tablespoon diced green pepper
6 ounces elbow spaghetti
1 tablespoon cornstarch
2 tablespoons cold water
2 teaspoons soy sauce
1 cup fresh or frozen green beans

Cut lamb into long strips about 2x1/4x1/4 inches. Coat with flour, salt and pepper. Melt fat or drippings in skillet and brown meat. Add hot water, bouillon cube and green beans. Sprinkle with onion salt. Bring to boiling point. Cover and simmer 15 minutes longer. While sauce simmers cook spaghetti in boiling water until tender (about 8 minutes). Drain and rinse in hot water. While spaghetti is cooking combine cornstarch, cold water and soy sauce. Stir into lamb mixture and cook until thickened (about 3 minutes). Arrange spaghetti on hot serving dish and pour meat sauce over. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.

First fall apples would go well in this:

APPLE CHARLOTTE
12 slices bread
Butter
4 to 6 apples
Butter enough slices of bread to line a greased baking dish along the sides and bottom. Wash, peel, core and slice the apples. Dip them in nutmeg and sugar and fill the dish. Add dabs of butter. Cover the top with slices of buttered bread. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 45 minutes. If the top slices brown too quickly, cover them with greased paper for the last few minutes of baking. Serve plain, with or without Vanilla Cream. Serves 6.

Something hot for a hot day is this sandwich:
CONY ISLAND BEEF WICH
1 pound ground beef
1 1/2 cups chopped onions
1 cup chopped celery
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 can condensed tomato soup
1 to 1 1/2 tablespoons chili powder
1/4 cup water

Brown meat in small amount of hot fat. Add onions and celery; cook until tender. Add remaining ingredients, using enough chili powder to suit taste. Simmer 30 minutes. Add more salt, if desired, and serve in split buns, toasted or plain.
