

Guard General Forecasts Call For State Units

PORTLAND, July 27-(AP)—Oregon's adjutant general believes there is a good chance all national guardsmen will be called to active duty before the first of next year unless the Korean situation improves.

Maj. Gen. Thomas E. Rilea expressed this opinion in a radio broadcast released over a Portland station today.

"My personal opinion is that if the war goes against us all national guardsmen in the United States will be under federal banners prior to the first of the year," he said.

Rilea said he had talked to officials in Washington, D. C., today and was given no information to indicate that a call for Oregon national guardsmen would come soon, however.

In the radio talk, transcribed several days ago, Gen. Rilea, state selective service director, predicted that state draft quotas would be increased. His forecast proved right today when the defense department called for the drafting of more men.

District Court Operates in New Quarters

Marion county district court is operating this morning from new quarters in the public school administration, 460 N. High st.

Desks, typewriters, general office equipment and hundreds of law books and record books were moved Thursday from old quarters at 125 N. Liberty st.

Most of the equipment was still piled in the second floor hall or scattered about the offices in the old high school building Thursday afternoon, and District Judge Joseph Felton has asked law officers to cite most cases over to next Monday to avoid confusion.

Felton's office will be in room 217, and Constable Earl Adams will occupy room 204. Room 216 is the courtroom and the district court staff will operate in room 219.

Council to See Bids on Local Drainage Job

Salem city council will meet in special session at 5 p. m. today to open bids on the long-planned \$125,000 northeast Salem drainage project.

Many householders of the fast-grown Englewood and other northeast residential districts have complained of basement and street floodings during the wet season in recent years. During the past year a 10-year master plan of city projects was developed, with high priority going to the necessary drainage of that area. Financing was voted by the electorate last spring.

City Manager J. L. Franzen said construction work in the drainage would start almost immediately after the contract award.

The special council meeting also was expected to include discussion of some eminent domain suits the city might have to file to obtain necessary right-of-way for the drains.

Plan for Dispersal of U. S. Capital Claimed

WASHINGTON, July 27-(AP)—The Washington Post said in a copyrighted story tonight that a secret plan for dispersal of key government agencies within a 50-mile radius of Washington is to be made public soon.

The Post said the plan calls for a ring of new satellite government towns to be built. Government agencies made no immediate comment on the story.

The U.S.S.R. is made up of 16 constituent republics.

Farmers Union Vote to Purchase Highway Frontage

The Oregon Farmers union cooperative association voted Thursday night to solicit stock for purchase of four acres on highway 99-E just north of Salem as a Farmers Union center.

John A. Rademaker was named chairman of a stock-soliciting committee which also includes W. L. Barnett, Aldon Bowes, H. R. Bristol and Theodore Nelson. The board of directors has secured an option on the property which is located on the site of the former Oregon Fuel company, fronting on the highway.

Truman Rules Out A-Bomb In Korea Fight

WASHINGTON, July 27-(AP)—President Truman today ruled out the use of the atomic bomb in the present struggle in Korea. He said such a move is not now under consideration.

And, to make sure there is no atomic sneak attack on American shores, the house quickly whipped through a bill authorizing search of all foreign flag vessels entering American waters.

A reporter at a White House news conference recalled that Mr. Truman once said he would not hesitate to employ the atomic bomb again if necessary to assure world peace.

The president replied he is not considering that step now.

As for the home front, Mr. Truman said moves are under way to deal with traitors and saboteurs in the war emergency.

How to Report Forest Fires Told by KOG

What should John Q. Citizen do if he sees a fire in the woods at this forest fire danger season?

Many people have asked that of the Keep Oregon Green association. It offers this set of instructions which every citizen is urged to follow:

Go to the nearest telephone. Tell the operator you wish to report a forest fire. She will connect you with the nearest fire warden or ranger.

Tell the fire warden the approximate location of the fire. Give nearest landmarks, crossroads or identifying aids to help orient the fire.

Do not report the fire if men are fighting it.

Telephone operators are urged to cooperate and save the time of fire headquarters dispatchers by advising the citizen if the fire has been reported already.

Canadians to Spend 'Thousands' on Defense

OTTAWA, July 27-(AP)—The Canadian government has decided to spend "thousands of dollars" in excess of its current defense budget of \$425,000,000 because of the Korean war, Defense Minister Brooke Claxton said tonight.

He declined to specify the amount the cabinet had decided to go over the budget.

Son Identified In Wirephoto Of Korean War

Yesterday's Statesman was just like a cable from Korea for Francis L. Inghram, 1235 N. 16th st.

He believes the unidentified G.I. in the center of the page-one AP wirephoto is his son, Pfc Samuel D. Inghram, 19.

Inghram said his son enlisted several years ago after attending Salem schools, was once stationed at Korea, and was believed returning there from Hawaii when last heard from about a month ago.

Mac Visits Korea Front, 'Confident Ultimate Victory'

A U. S. AIR STRIP IN KOREA, July 27-(AP)—General Douglas MacArthur visited the Korean warfront today for the second time and went away "never more confident in victory — ultimate victory — in my life than I am now."

The commander of the United Nations forces flew in unheralded this morning for a conference with his top commanders at U. S. Eighth army headquarters.

"I have a feeling of optimism after my inspection today," MacArthur told newsmen. "I am completely confirmed in the estimates that I made to the president of the United States last week that the enemy lost his great chance for victory in the last three weeks."

Bureau Suggests Stock Division in Gas Firm Change

WASHINGTON, July 27-(AP)—The securities and exchange commission today received a recommendation from its public utilities division that in the pending reorganization of the Portland (Ore) Gas and Coke Co. 93 per cent of the new common stock should go to preferred stockholders and seven per cent to owners of common stocks.

Portland is a gas utility subsidiary of American Power & Light Co., a registered holding company, and serves manufactured gas in Portland and surrounding communities.

Wreckage of Plane Found, 25 Missing

TOKYO, Friday, July 28-(AP)—Japanese fishermen today found the wreckage of a transport plane that plunged into the sea 80 miles south of Tokyo yesterday with 28 persons aboard.

One survivor was located by rescue planes and a helicopter was being set out. Search for the other 25—the passenger list was believed to include four war correspondents—was being pressed.

First American Marines in European waters during the Revolution were those aboard the "Reprisal," which took Benjamin Franklin to France in 1776 and later captured several British prizes.
