## White Grade School At Hubbard To Close Door After 48 Years

HUBBARD—Weeds are fast erasing the path which leads from highway 99E to White school, one of Willamette valley's few remaining one-room grade schools, just north of here.

The little building, built by volunteers in 1898, will soon go on the block, the victim of consolidation as Marion county steps up its education standards.

The old-style school, where many Hubbard children, their parents, grandparents and great grandparents learned their three R's, will be still when the fall term opens.

Instead, White school children will board a shiny, yellow school bus bound for Hubbard.

The White school district was organized in 1855, but no school was built until 1862. During this period school was held in the homes.

The first building was completed by M. A. White. At that time there were about 15 pupils with Mrs. Mary Smith serving as teacher.

Attending during the following 14 years were such well known Hubbard area residents as Earl Grimm, Henry and Lawrence Schull, Henry Mills, Alice Weaver, Lora Ramage, Clyde Yoder, Clara Burkholder, Clara Zeigler, Elmer Will and the Schwatlerlee and John Kroff families.

In 1898 the present school was built and the old one moved to an adjoining farm. During the years many children came and left, as many as 50 pupils attending during some years. Three generations of some families have received their education in the little schoolhouse.

Some of the teachers who have contributed to education of the community's youth are Howard Eccles, Lottie Fry, Florence Beardsley, Matilda Gilles, Emma Bisanz, Clara Stange and Elizabeth King, last year's teacher. Bonita Diller has been music teacher at the school for the past six years.

Modern education trends touched the school in 1930 when a play shed was built. In 1947, the building was remodeled. This year, the school received an award as the one-room school showing the greatest health improvement in Marion county.

In March of this year school patrons voted to consolidate with Hubbard school, ending White school's long and faithful career.

Members of the last graduating class are Donald Hill, Wilma Hooper, Marjorie Jesky, Robert Miley, Ellen Hooper and Charlotte Kenagy.

The old bell in the belfry has rung for the last time. School is out.

## Beavers, Men Match Wits Near Stayton

STAYTON—Men, armed with bulldozers and steamshovels, have been battling beavers, armed with teeth, on a Mill creek drainage facility between Stayton and Aumsville.

And for a while it looked like the beavers would win.

Beaver dams kept ground so wet on one end of the project which involves deepening of a channel of upper Mill creek to secure better drainage, that clearing operations were held up.

Dams, torn out by men during the day, were rebuilt during the night by beavers. Dynamiting failed to stop the animals.

An emergency call was put in to state police. Officers sent a trapper. Using wire mesh traps, he took the beavers into custody. They were released on the Santiam river.

Progress was normal today, workers reported.
