Keep an eye on what goes on in home furnishings fashions, and you will see that more and more metal is being used to make furniture. Not just all-metal outdoor furniture and dinette sets, but important living room and dining room pieces. Chairs, sofas and love seats have metal frames. Wood storage units have metal legs. Tables, for use with other metal furniture or with wood furniture, are metal with tops of glass, wood, slate and marble. And here's a new table which combines brass with cork. The table top and the top of the table base is cork covered, the column and edges are brass. Brass corner pull-outs hold refreshment glasses and ashtrays. This is a two-height wonder that's two tables in one. At its tallest, it's a card table. When it's lowered it's a coffee table.

New Style Sofas and Love Seats Can Be Converted Into Comfortable Beds

The extra bed in a small home or apartment was once limited to studio couches or folding cots, which are poorly disguised sleeping accommodations for overnight guests. Today you can choose from a wide range of sofas, chair beds, sections and love seats that fit into any decor and can hardly be recognized as beds when closed.

From inexpensive ready-made models to fine custom made jobs, these double-duty pieces of furniture can be as individual as any other furniture in your home. One designer has a pair of modern sections covered with a Chinese damask print that makes an elegant corner when set on either side of a black Chinese corner table. Each sectional has one arm, allowing for

a corner of the room arrangement when the table is fitted into a corner of the room. Each sectional opens into a large single bed with fine springs and innerspring mattresses. By eliminating the corner table, you can have twin beds when you put the sections side-by-side. In many of the new homes that have an extra guest bedroom, the hostess has found that using a sofa, chair or love seat bed combination gives her an extra all-time room for her own use. A comfortable arm chair, set in one corner, leaves plenty of space for her sewing machine, family record files, desk and other work pieces, which would be hard to crowd into a room with a full-sized bed, left open all the time.

You can select a chair bed in any period from early American to contemporary—or even more elaborate earlier periods—and build your den around the same period.
