Very Small

Individual Meals or Small Servings Are Frozen to Accomodate Lone Diner

For several years eastern markets have sold entire meals frozen and ready to heat up and serve. It has been handy for working apartment house dwellers, who have to get meals together in a hurry. Sometimes the ready prepared meals include fish, French fried potatoes, a roll, a vegetable and some sort of dessert.

They are frozen individually but arranged together in a carton. Sometimes everything is cooked, other times it has to be cooked after purchased.

Living alone, we feel that individual servings of frozen foods is a good idea, and is also practical for a family of two. When one prepares food such as pot roast, chicken or even a stew, it's necessary to eat it for several days before it's used up. Freezing food in small servings would make menus more versatile and stretch some of the more expensive foods over several weeks or months instead of having them leftovers for several days after their first appearance.

With our setup, we think it impractical to prepare a complete meal and freeze it together, but individual servings are going to be our object.

Single packages of a vegetable, cake cut into portions, individual pies and even small containers of cooked meats will be included in the contents of the freezer.

Smaller packages, done up in bags when possible, fit better into a small freezer too. You can fill up the spaces between cartons with the smaller and more flexible packages.

Take a stewing hen, for instance, and we have them frequently on the farm, we can cook them and then put them up in a half dozen packages, each enough for one or two meals. If company comes, more than one package may be opened.

Rolls and home made bread are other things which will lend themselves to freezing for a small family. It's very little more trouble to make four loaves than one, or two dozen rolls than half a dozen. Yeast breads are especially good in the freezer.

It takes considerable time for one person, especially if inclined to be reducing, to eat up a loaf of bread. And the frozen variety is as good as fresh, though it dries out faster upon thawing.

Experimentation in freezing foods can be quite an adventure. One can get inspiration by looking into the frozen foods counters at the grocery stores and seeing the collection of fried potatoes, cooked chicken, tamales (which gives the idea of a tamale pie ready-cooked and frozen) rolls, frozen pies and other foods.
