Strawberries, Caneberries Leave Market

Strawberries have disappeared from the Portland market and many of the earlier cane berries are gone, too. Loganberries and a few of blackberry varieties are still being offered. The evergreens, both the cultivated ones with thorns and the thornless berries have not yet begun to arrive. In some sections the evergreens will be scarce but in most the crop will be average, growers report.

As a whole loganberries have been good, although a few growers are reporting that their vines were badly diseased this year and this showed up in the quality of the berry. More interest is being shown each year in purchase of disease-free vines.

Everbearing strawberries are now coming on and a new variety, the Streamliner, seems to be doing very well in this area. This berry is much larger and better colored than the more familiar Rockhill. It also may be a trifle more tart but it has an excellent strawberry flavor, absent in a number of the everbearing varieties.

Blueberries and huckleberries are also appearing on the markets. Gardeners who have four or five blueberry bushes report sufficient berries for family use with a few to put in the deepfreeze. Blueberries are very good keepers in coldstorage. Nurserymen warn that unless they can be given an acid, humus, well-drained soil, it is of no use to attempt their culture. However, under right conditions the blueberry produces very well in the home garden.

Apriots from The Dalles are now arriving but are as a whole rather high priced this season—very nearly double the price asked a year ago. The crop is reported small this year.

Oregon peaches have not arrived on the market so far, and few are expected except from the southern Oregon area. One orchard in Polk county boasts a "fair crop," but as a whole there is no Willamette valley crop of peaches. California peaches have been arriving and selling at about one and one-half times as high as they did last year at the same time in the harvest. The California crop is reported as being exceptionally good this season.

Eight Enlist in Air Force at Local Office

Names of eight air force enlistees through the Salem recruiting office this week were listed Friday, as the office noted that most rejections of army and air force applicants have been for dental reasons.

Five of the last seven rejections, in recent weeks, of Salem men have been because their teeth were below service standards, according to M. Sgt. Hugh M. Smith. He noted the minimum requirement of 16 good teeth, at least four opposing on each side, plus incisors. For the air force, at least, he said, full or partial plates are preferable to fillings, which might give trouble at high altitudes.

Lively Bidding for Sewage Disposal Plant Forecast

Lively bidding interest in Salem's sewage disposal plant was forecast in Salem Friday by John W. Cunningham, consulting engineer working with the city in planning the project.

He said three firms already have called for plans and many others are expected to take out plans prior to the August 14 bid opening. Advertising of the bid opening has just begun. Estimated cost of the entire sewage plant is \$848,000. This does not include excavation which is now completed or interceptor sewers which are already in. Construction is expected to be completed by April, 1951.

Wiley Hulsey Succumbs to Short Illness

Wiley Nicholson Hulsey, 83, a retired Southern Pacific railway clerk who had lived in Salem since 1908, died here Friday after a three-week illness.

Born Aug. 26, 1867, in Fannin county in Texas, Hulsey was a railroad employe most of his life and was a member of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks. He also was a member of the Masonic lodge in Texas and of Chemeketa lodge 1, IOOF, and the Presbyterian church in Salem.

Hulsey was preceded in death by his wife, Martha Emeline, in 1942 and two sons, Howard in 1935 and Homer in 1948. Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Beryl Muhlaupt, Salem, and Mrs. Clara Hill, Katy, Tex.; a son, Clifford A. Hulsey, Castroville, Calif.; two sisters in Texas and nine grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Monday from the V. T. Golden chapel with Dr. Chester W. Hamblin officiating. The Odd Fellows lodge will conduct ritualistic services with interment to be in Belcrest Memorial park.

County Reports No Pedestrian Lane Funds

Reply that no funds have been appropriated for pedestrian lanes along Marion county roads was ready Friday for transmission from the county court to Salem school district board. The board had asked for such lanes in two areas east of the city as a protection to school children.

The locations listed were Silver-ton road from Lana avenue to Lancaster drive and along Lancaster from Monroe avenue to Center street. The county noted that part of the former line is within the city.

County Judge Grant Murphy said the district would be informed, as others have been in the past, that such work would have to be financed from road funds. It will be requested to appear at the annual budget meeting to make a showing for diversion from "already inadequate road funds."

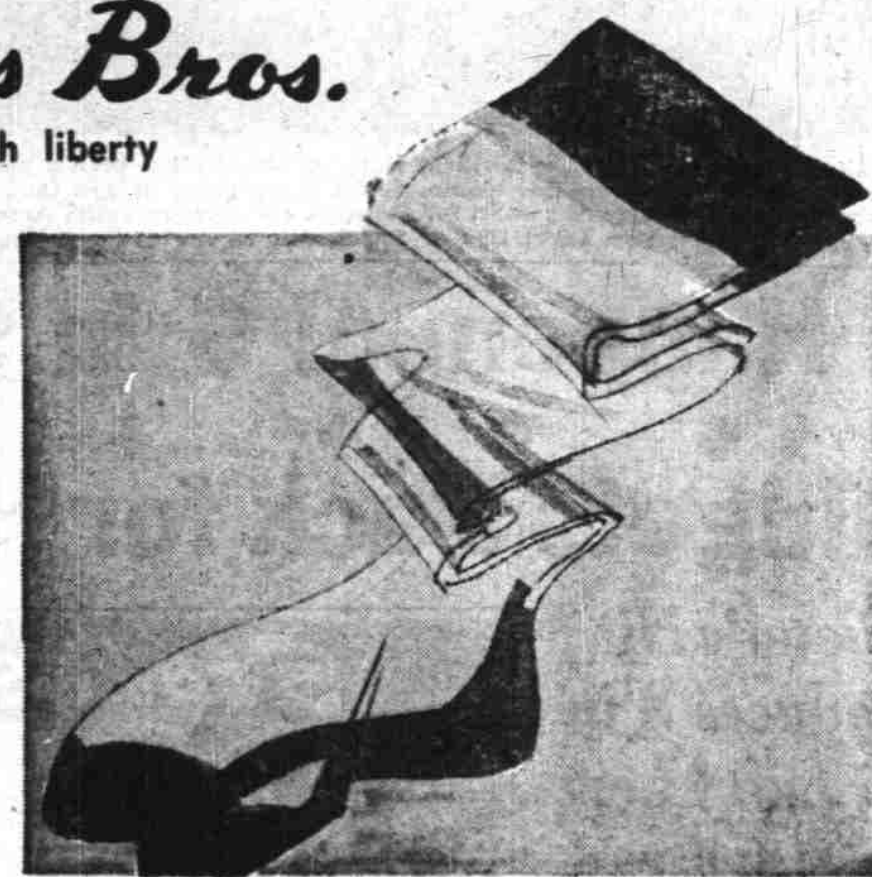
