

Leaders to Hear Plan for Huge Increase in Foreign Arms Aid

WASHINGTON, July 28—(AP)—A huge increase in foreign arms aid—reportedly as much as \$4,000,000,000—will be discussed with democratic and republican congressional leaders at a White house conference.

President Truman, already firmly on record about the need for stepping up the common security program of non-communist nations, will lay the projected increase before the lawmakers in the presence of Secretary of State Acheson and Secretary of Defense Johnson.

It would augment the \$1,222,500,000 authorization already approved by congress to furnish arms during the current fiscal year to the nations abroad.

Word that the increase may total \$4,000,000,000 came from several sources, including republican senators who conferred for an hour today with John Foster Dulles, Acheson's republican adviser.

Top democratic and republican members of the house and senate appropriations, armed services and foreign relations committees will go to the White house for the conference.

Meet to Plan Emergency Fire Protection

Emergency fire protection for every area of Oregon will be planned August 15 in Salem at a meeting of county fire control representatives.

Robert Taylor, state fire marshal and recently appointed chief of civilian fire defense, announced plans for the meeting Friday. The plan calls for mutual aid among metropolitan, county and state forestry fire units in case of war or peacetime emergency.

Equipment will be dispatched by state headquarters from one to another where disaster strikes, just as city fire departments do with sub-stations, Taylor said.

Eight fire districts have been mapped out in the state and counties in each district will choose one representative to sit on a state council. The council also will have representatives from Portland, the state forestry service and communications experts.

Red Radio Says Bombs Fall on U.S. Prisoners

WASHINGTON, July 28—(AP)—An American army officer was quoted today by the communist-controlled Seoul radio as saying bombs dropped by U. S. planes killed 42 American prisoners of the North Koreans in a single attack.

The officer was identified as Maj. Charles C. Barter, S-3 or operations officer of the 63rd field artillery battalion, 24th div. He was quoted as saying he was captured at Konju and was one of a group of 169 prisoners who were bombed on July 17.

The broadcast, one of a series ascribed to American prisoners, was recorded by U. S. government monitors. Officials said the statement ascribed to the officer apparently was read by him, but they suspected it may have been written by his captors. It said the American prisoners were "cursing our U. S. ruling clique and superiors who are directing the military intervention."

FBI Launches Drive to Stop Spies, Sabotage

WASHINGTON, July 28—(AP)—The government today opened a drive to catch and prosecute spies and saboteurs on the home front. This was disclosed in two separate announcements.

1. J. Edgar Hoover, FBI director, said each citizen can play an important part in stopping communists who would bore from within.

The citizen's job: to report quickly to the FBI any evidence of subversion or sabotage.

2. Attorney General McGrath announced that the justice department intends to be ready for any evidence that might be turned up. Effective October 1, he said, four federal grand juries — instead of the usual two — will be kept on duty here.

To Use Grand Jury
At least one grand jury will be used exclusively to deal with charges of subversive activity.

McGrath said top priority will be given "to all criminal matters in the internal security and defense fields."

Although J. Edgar Hoover asked each citizen to supply the FBI with any evidence of sabotage, he also issued a warning:

The FBI wants facts. Don't bothy it with rumors or malicious gossip or your own personal opinion. Issue Advice to Public
Hoover gave some helpful advice:

1. "The FBI is as near to you as your telephone." Every phone book has the FBI number on the first page. Phone, write or drop by the nearest office.
2. Give all the facts you have in your possession. Sometimes a small bit of information is the exact small bit the FBI is seeking.
3. Remember, facts are what the FBI wants. "Avoid reporting malicious gossip or idle rumors."
4. Don't spread any rumors yourself, and don't draw any conclusions from the information you give the FBI. Your information could be wrong—and injure an innocent person.
5. Once you've given the FBI the information, don't turn cop yourself. That's the job of the FBI, with its trained investigators. "Hysteria, witch-hunts and vigilantes weaken internal security," Hoover said.

Furthermore, "in cases involving espionage it is more important to identify spies, their contacts, sources of information and methods of communications than to make immediate arrests."

6. "Be alert. The greatest defenders against sabotage are the loyal American workmen who are producing the materials and weapons for our defense."

Truman Asks Stockpile of Rare Materials

WASHINGTON, July 28—(AP)—President Truman asked congress today for \$600,000,000 for stockpiling strategic and critical materials and \$18,000,000 for renovation of reserve merchant ships.

The chief executive submitted supplemental estimates of appropriations calling for provision for the money during this fiscal year. The estimate of \$600,000,000 for the general services administration for stockpiling includes \$6,000,000 for the reactivation of aluminum facilities.

The stockpiling funds would be in addition to the \$500,000,000 of new obligational authority for stockpiling recommended by the president in the budget submitted last January.

Majestic, Reo Movie Houses Sold at Dallas

DALLAS, July 28 — Sale of Dallas' two theatres, the Majestic and Reo, was revealed Friday.

Don Vernal, manager, reported that Jesse Jones, Portland, had sold them to a Montana man whose name was not disclosed. The new owner will take over on August 15.
