Men from Silverton and Albany will leave the United States this week on an expedition to the Arctic circle, the naval news center at Great Lakes, Ill., announced Saturday.

They are Russell A. Marcoe, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Marcoe, Silverton; and Donald C. Douglas, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Douglas, Albany route 4.

They will be crew members aboard a landing ship bound for Point Barrow, Alaska, northernmost point on the North American continent.

Main purpose of the expedition is to bring supplies to a naval petroleum reserve. Delivery of these supplies can be accomplished only during a few weeks in the summer.
