North Valley Crops Tour Schedule Set

The north Willamette valley 4-H livestock and crops tour Monday to Wednesday will include Richard Grim, Wallace Dumlery, Ronald Simmons, Roy Moore and Richard Berlin, all of Salem, according to Jim Bishop, city 4-H extension agent, who will accompany them.

Approximately 110 4-H boys and girls from Marion, Yamhill, Clackamas, Multnomah and Hood River counties are expected to participate in the tour, led by county extension agents and local 4-H leaders.

The Red Hills experimental area at Oregon City will be the first stop, followed by viewing livestock and crops on several Clackamas county farms in the afternoon. The group will camp overnight at the fair grounds at Canby.

Jersey cattle at the Rex Ross farm and Holsteins at the C. J. Berning farm near Mt. Angel will be judged by the group Tuesday. In the evening, after a swim, the group will camp at Silverton city park.

Wednesday morning will be spent viewing crops and judging hogs at the George Kraus farm in the North Howell district. Lunch is planned at Silver Creek falls park with a hike around the falls before starting for home.

All meals, except lunch the first day, will be prepared and cooked during the tour by the group.

Western Music Roundup Set

Residents of the Willamette valley have been invited to participate in the World Championship Western Music roundup which will open August 23 in Vancouver, B. C.

Eight open and six amateur events are scheduled exclusively for northwest participants. A 27-event program will include square dance orchestras, western vocal groups, vocal soloists, barbershop quartets, old-time fiddlers, square dance callers and senior square dance orchestras.

Entries should be filed by August 12 with the Pacific National Exposition in Vancouver.

Excavation of Trunk Sewer Line to Start

Digging for the trunk sewer line which will serve the extreme north section of Salem, as far east as Washington school, probably will begin Monday, City Engineer J. H. Davis said Saturday.

The project will mean detouring North Commercial street traffic to Broadway street for several days.

Work by a small city crew, using machines to dig the ditch and to lay the pipe, will start from the trunk's intersection with the interceptor sewer line running north along Commercial.

The line is to go eastward along the north side of Mapleton addition, through state lands just north of the school for the deaf, along the south side of Capital Lumber company mill, through Valley Packing company property, along Lana avenue to Silverton road and out that road to Lansing avenue. In the process it will be tunneled under both the Oregon Electric and Southern Pacific tracks, the latter at Lana avenue.

The city does not plan to augment the trunk with a lateral sewerage system this year, but the project will make such a system possible later.

The job, estimated to cost \$94,500, is expected to take about four months to complete. It will require more than 6,000 feet of 48-inch-diameter pipe and various lengths of smaller size. The pipe is being made by Collins Concrete Pipe company of Portland at the Salem Concrete Pipe and Products company plant.

State to Open TB Ward Bids

Bids for construction of the proposed \$650,000 tuberculosis ward at the Oregon state hospital here will be opened by the state board of control August 18, Roy Mills, board secretary, announced Friday.

The tuberculosis ward will be two stories high, of fire-proof construction and would contain 144 beds. It would be located at the east end of the new treatment building. Furnishings were estimated to cost in excess of \$100,000.

Rev. Brown Addresses Conference

JENNINGS LODGE, July 29—(AP) (Special)—The Rev. Wilmer N. Brown, pastor of First Evangelical United Brethren church, Salem, spoke Thursday night to the joint session here of the Oregon U.B. and Oregon-Washington U.B. conferences here. His subject was his recent trip to Palestine.

The Oregon committee on social action presented a report urging "our national leaders to seek to establish international control of the atomic bomb and hydrogen bomb, and we request our government not to use these as a means of war upon our enemies."

"The committee also urged a positive fight against liquor and tobacco "by voting whenever possible for temperance measures and by voting for men who are in the fight for temperance."

Newport Youth Harries Police In Portland

PORTLAND, July 29—(AP)—Hervey L. Bromagin, 19, Newport, is in jail here, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, stealing two cars and violating federal parole.

But police said that didn't begin to tell the story of his escapades last night in southeast Portland.

Policeman Leo J. Kaiser said Bromagin took an automobile belonging to David A. Smith of Oregon City. After sideswiping one car, he banged into two others, then eluded pursuing motorists, Kaiser said. Next the youth failed to make a turn and wound up with the car in shrubbery in a front yard.

The officer said Bromagin took another car, ran into a curb and bounced into the side of an apartment house.

By then police caught up. But, Kaiser said, the youth pulled a knife on them. Relieved of it, he kicked a policeman while being put into the paddy wagon.

He wound up the wild night by kicking the jailer while being put into a cell, Kaiser said.

Double Rocket Reaches Speed Of 3,600 mph

LONG RANGE PROVING GROUND, COCOA, Fla., July 29—(AP)—A war rocket weighing 28,700 pounds at the takeoff thundered nine miles high in 63 seconds today and fired a secondary missile which sped eastward at some 3,600 miles an hour.

The war rocket was a captured German V-2. The secondary missile was a scientific rocket called the "WAC Corporal" and was not designed for war use. It was the second test launching of guided missiles on horizontal courses.

The "WAC Corporal" rode up to the nine mile height in the nose of the V-2. There it automatically separated as the V-2 attained its maximum speed of 2,727 miles an hour. Details of the "WAC Corporal's" performance were secret, but it was officially stated that its speed was in excess of 5,000 feet a second. That adds up to around 3,600 miles an hour.

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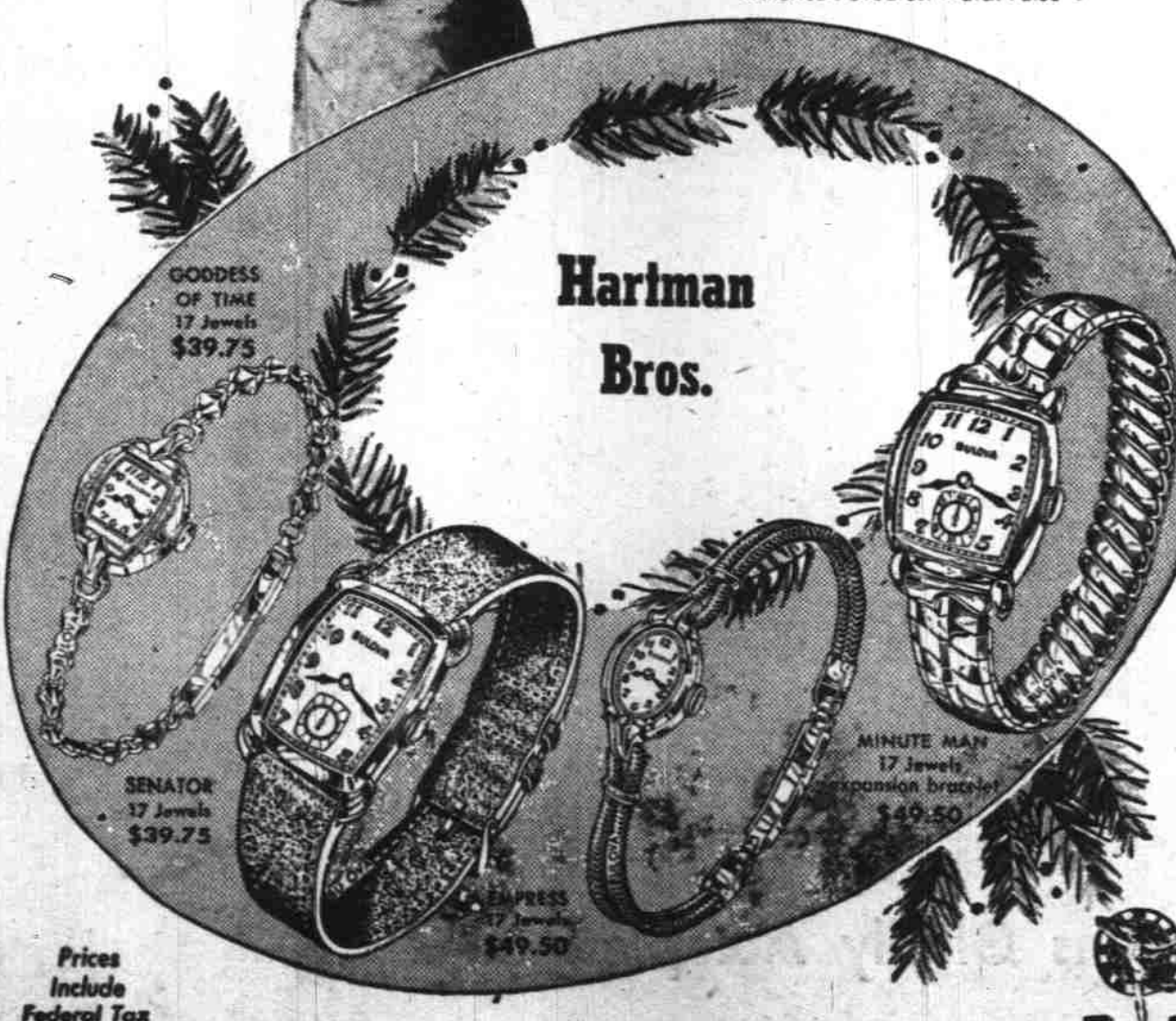
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
