

Dunne Calls For Money to Wage Campaign

PORTLAND, July 31-(P)—Oregon Pension Group Leader Joe Dunne told an independent party assembly tonight he would seek the governorship in November—if he can raise the money.

Dunne's statement came after lengthy debate on whether or not the aims of the old age pensioners would best be served by putting a third candidate in the gubernatorial race.

Nomination petitions apparently had given Dunne enough signatures tonight to get his name on the ballot if he goes ahead with his campaign.

The assembly was not unanimous, however, in its vote that Dunne should run. An Oregonian reporter at the assembly said it was apparent that some democratic party members present were discouraging the Dunne candidacy. Dunne had declared prior to the May primary he would be a candidate if State Senator Austin Fegel got the democratic nomination. Dunne had explained he didn't like the old age pension policies of either Flagel or Republican Incumbent Douglas McKay, who was renominated.

Speakers declared failure to put over the Dunne candidacy might boomerang against later attempts by pension advocates to win more liberal state pension payments and regulations.

Death Claims Fred Walker

PRINEVILLE, July 31-(P)—Death has claimed Fred W. Walker, 71, for many years prominent in Oregon fraternal circles. Walker was a past grand master of the Oregon Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows, and was a past state president of Lions International. He had been a funeral director here since 1941.

Previously to 1941 he had operated mortuaries in Salem, Eugene and Springfield.

Stock Market Trading Makes Small Advance

NEW YORK, July 31-(P)—The stock market ground out a modest advance today after overcoming an early-session slump.

Aircraft, favorites and several issues pushed higher from \$1 to nearly \$2.50 a share. The plane makers' stocks were buoyant because of a huge buying program by the U.S. air force.

Automotive stocks, spearheaded by General Motors, steel, rubbers, radio-television, mining, chemical and oil issues also were higher. Rails, utilities, motion pictures and airlines were mixed. No group showed a majority of losses over gains.

Outside of the aircraft category, however, few stocks showed gains of as much as \$1 a share. The creeping advance, fourth in as many days, was accomplished despite a substantial drop in business. Sales totaled 1,590,000 shares, making it the first time in 10 sessions that volume was under the 2,000,000 mark. Friday's total was 2,090,000.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced .3 of a point at 7:55, high mark of the index for all July. The average was, in fact, at its peak since it stood at 79.0 on June 23, the day before the Korean war began. Industrials were up .6, rails .1 and utilities unchanged.

Retorts Prove Expensive in Police Court

PORTLAND, July 31-(P)—To his sorrow, Lee H. Grunden, 48, of Beaverton learned today that Police Judge John B. Seabrook believes in the saying: "When they ask for it, give it to 'em."

Grunden faced the judge on a charge of slapping Mrs. Val Walls, Portland, on a downtown street. He explained that he mistook her for another woman.

"That'll be 90 days," said the judge.

"Well," replied the defendant, "I really should have hit her, then."

"One hundred eighty days," Seabrook replied.

"Why don't you make it \$500, too," Grunden asked.

"All right," the judge agreed, "Six months and \$500."

Seamen Screened For Commie Suspects

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31-(P)—The coast guard today began screening all seamen signing aboard foreign bound ships, whether they carry war cargoes or not.

The security procedure, voluntarily agreed upon last week by union and company representatives is intended to keep known or suspected communists or subversives off American ships.

Truman Uses Influence in Missouri Vote

President Truman's influence as a vote getter rides on the outcome of the Missouri democratic senatorial primary today.

Kansas, Virginia and West Virginia also hold their primaries today, with Tennessee voting Thursday and Kentucky Saturday.

In the big Missouri race, Mr. Truman has come out strongly for Emory W. Allison of Rolla, a veteran state senator. Considerable grass roots strength, however, is reported to have built up behind former congressman Thomas C. Hennings, Jr. of St. Louis, and a tight battle was in prospect.

Hennings has sought to make an issue of "Pendergastism" and has criticized the president's intervention in the campaign.

Donnell for GOP
Allison and Hennings, along with three other democrats, are trying to win nomination to the seat now held by Senator Forrest C. Donnell, republican. Donnell is expected to get the GOP nomination with little trouble, although he has three opponents.

Both a senate seat and the governorship are at stake in the Kansas voting, with interest centered on the latter race, largely because Alf M. Landon, 1936 GOP presidential nominee, has taken a hand in it.

For governor, Landon is supporting Willard Mayberry, his former secretary. Gov. Frank Carlson and Senator Harry Darby have teamed up behind Edward F. Arn, former Kansas attorney general.

The winner—provided he is elected in November—gets to name the republican state chairman and thus control the state party machinery in advance of the 1952 presidential nominating convention. Landon at present is on the outside looking in, but hopes for better things if Mayberry comes through.

Trying for Senate
Darby, who was appointed senator by Carlson upon the death of Senator Clyde Reed, isn't running this time. Carlson himself is trying for the senate nomination, and is opposed by Harry W. Colmery, former national commander of the American Legion.

In the Kansas democratic primary, Paul Aiken, former assistant postmaster general, is running against National Committeeman Carl Rice for the senate nomination.

Four of Kansas' six republican house members have opposition in the primary. In Missouri, the 12 democratic and one republican representatives are running for re-nomination, but seven of them, including Dewey Short, the lone republican, have no opposition in today's election.

One GOP contest
In the Virginia voting, only three of the state's nine democratic house members have opposition in the primary. There is one republican contest, in the eighth district.

In West Virginia, former U.S. Senator Rush D. Holt, now a state legislator, has switched parties and is trying for a seat in the house of representatives at Washington in the republican primary. Democrats now hold all six seats from West Virginia.

The standout race in the Tennessee primary Thursday involves the attempt of former republican national chairman B. Carroll Reece to unseat Rep. Dayton E. Phillips in the first district.

In Kentucky Saturday, the voters choose senatorial nominees, Gov. Earle Clements and Secretary of State Glenn Hatcher have squared off for the democratic nomination. (Senator Withers, an appointed senator, isn't running).

The two chief contenders in the republican race are Charles I. Dawson, former Kentucky attorney general, and Charles E. Whitely, former public service commissioner.

Reynolds and Cobb collided when Cobb turned left off State street and the impact hurled the latter's machine into the Burlington car, according to investigating officers.

Cobb's car was smashed on both sides and the others sustained extensive front-end damage.

Controls Plan Broadened

WASHINGTON, July 31-(P)—Administration forces in the house took steps today to broaden a proposed economic controls bill in an effort to satisfy swelling demands to get all-out anti-inflation powers ready for use.

In the absence of any definite word from President Truman's lieutenants, it appeared likely the changes might cover some form of stand-by authority for the president to control prices and wages and to ration scarce goods when he thinks those steps are needed.

The move apparently was designed to head off the possibility that republicans may ram through their own controls bill.

Pole, Not Gun, Made Holes in Plane's Wing

LEBANON, July 31—A rescuer's pike pole, not bullets, made the holes found in a light plane which crashed at Toledo Sunday, carrying a prominent Lebanon lumberman to his death.

Killed when his light plane plunged into Yaguina bay was Aaron Ingram, 37, veteran Lebanon pilot and owner of mills at Lebanon, Holly and Newport.

Lincoln county authorities who investigated the accident believed Sunday Ingram was the victim of bullets which crippled the plane.

The mystery of several holes found in the fuselage was solved today when a logger who helped remove the plane from 12 feet of water said he made the punctures with a pike pole.

Funeral services for Ingram will be held Wednesday, August 2, at 2 p.m. from the Howe-Huston funeral home in Lebanon. Interment will be in the Liberty Community cemetery near Holley. The Rev. Harvey J. Schmidt, pastor of the Lebanon First Presbyterian church, will officiate.

10 DIE IN BRAZIL CRASH

PORTO ALEGRE, Brazil, July 31-(P)—Ten persons died in the crash of a two-engine Savag airplane yesterday between Itu and Porto Alegre. The plane, flying in bad weather, struck a low hill near Sao Francisco.

Chinese Reds Offer Korean Mediation Plan

LONDON, July 31-(P)—An official British commonwealth source said today the communist government in China has proposed a settlement of the Korean conflict through mediation by Asian nations.

Coming on the eve of Russia's return to the United Nations, the informant expressed the view that the actions of the communist China and the Soviet Union might be related and that Russia might formally present the Chinese idea to the security council.

Red China's mediation idea, the informant said, include these details:

There should be a quick ceasefire.

The Asian neighbors of Korea -- not any of the western powers -- should try for a final settlement in the divided country with the idea of reunifying it and pacifying it.

Countries specifically named by Chou En Lai which might participate in any mediation undertaking would include India, Pakistan, and Burma.

It is not known whether India has replied. It is believed she will not indicate her reactions until she hears what Jakob Malik, the Soviet's chief United Nations delegate, has to say about Korea when he assumes the chairmanship of the security council tomorrow.

Betty Hutton Reunited with Ex-Husband

CHICAGO, July 31-(P)—Betty Hutton, screen star, and ex-husband Ted Briskin are "definitely back together as of right now," the blonde actress said tonight.

Briskin, an executive of a Chicago camera company, said "I think now we have a much better understanding and I'm pretty sure we can work it out all right."

The couple, parents of two small daughters, was divorced in California five months ago. Their interdictory decree does not become final for a year, and Miss Hutton said "I think they will just strike it (the divorce) off."

Briskin said he hadn't checked "to see whether or not we have to get married again."

"The most important thing," "The most important thing," Briskin told a reporter, "is that we've reached a better understanding. I think we owe it to ourselves and our children to give it another try."
