Terry Allen Defends Against Dado Marino

HONOLULU, July 31—(P)—Rival managers of Terry Allen and Dado Marino each predicted today a knockout victory by his boy in their world flyweight title bout here tomorrow night.
Johnny Sharpe, manager of titleholder Allen, said Terry would stop Marino "between the 11th and 13th rounds."
Sad Sam Ichinose, who manages Marino, said, "Dado will keep Allen by the seventh."
The managers agreed that their fighters are in good condition.
Sharpe said Allen, 25-year-old Londoner who beat Honore Pratet of France three months ago to win the crown, is "in excellent form and ready for the toughest sort of fight."
Sad Sam said Marino, 34-year-old Honolulu beer truck driver, is keyed up and "in the fighting mood I've ever seen him in."
Allen and Marino signed their final contracts this afternoon for the fight in Honolulu stadium.
Both should be below the 112-pound limit for the weigh-in tomorrow.
