SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7-(P)-Harry Bridges lost another round today in his attempt to stay out of jail pending appeal of his perjury conviction.

Freedom Try

Federal District Judge Dal M. Lemmon turned down a habeas corpus writ in which the CIO longshore leader argued he is being held in violation of his con-stitutional liberties. The court made no comment.

The U.S. circuit court of appeals will consider tomorrow morning a Bridges' appeal for bail. This petition also was based on the con-tention that denial of bail violates Bridges' constitutional rights.

The petition argued that Bridges should be freed since the government has made no claim that he is a bad risk nor denied that there is grounds for appeal.

Federal District Judge George Harris revoked Bridges' \$25,000 bail Saturday. He declared the longshore president is a security risk whose "loyalty and allegiance are and must be with the com-
