Stock Market Again Topped By Radio-TV

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 (AP)—Radio-Television issues stole the show in the stock market again today.

TV shares zipped ahead for gains running to around \$3 a share. The balance of the market—with a few prominent exceptions—fiddled around in a fractional range. Advances outnumbered declines by a comfortable margin.

The snappy advance in the TV division was a follow-through to a similar show of strength Wednesday and limited improvement Monday and Tuesday.

The TV group was influenced by several factors. Probably the chief one was the belief that the TV industry will be able to fill consumer needs and military demands as well without too much difficulty.

Trading showed little inclination to expand on the way up.

Sales of 1,870,000 shares compared with 1,760,000 Wednesday. TV's advanced steeply after the opening while other groups were all but ignored. Then the entire market, including TV's, backed down for a while. Prices moved along without important change until the last few minutes of business when fresh demand appeared. Prices were at or close to the peaks of the day at the final bell.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dipped .1 of one point to 77.9. The utility division moved up slightly but industrials and rails were slightly lower.

Grain Prices Await Federal Price Report

CHICAGO, Aug. 10 (AP)—Grains stalled around today waiting for the regular monthly government crop report, due after the market closed. In very quiet dealings the market dipped early, rallied in the morning and then played out the session with little movement.

The most significant trend developed in wheat, which showed a little more firmness than anything else. Reports of a slight pick up in flour business were heard, and, in addition, receipts of the bread cereal at major terminals have not been running high.

Wheat closed 1/4-1/2 higher, corn unchanged to 1/4 lower, oats 1/4-1/2 higher, rye was unchanged to 1/4 higher, soybeans were 1/4 to 1 cent higher and lard was 17 to 32 cents a hundred pounds lower.

More favorable war news and splendid crop growing weather acted as a weight on the market. Nevertheless, there wasn't much selling, and some traders felt that might have been due to the fact that prices have backed down considerably from the post-Korea highs.

Anywhere from 25 to 60 per cent of the gains scored immediately after hostilities started in Korea now have been lost. The biggest loss has been in rye; the smallest in September corn. The following table gives final prices on June 24, the subsequent highs and today's close on near-by deliveries.
