Upstate Shrine '11' Holds Heavy Drill

PORTLAND, Aug. 18 (AP)—The end positions on the Oregon All-Star team for the third annual Shrine's hospital football game appear to have been won by Donald Hedgepeth of Grants Pass and Don Sigmund of Eugene. Gary Babcock of Corvallis and Dick Snow of Echo are pressing them.

The performances of the ends were the highlight of Friday's two practice stints, in which the coaches drove the squad through offensive signal drills.

In one backfield unit Coach Don Mabee grouped Barney Holland of Marshfield at quarterback, Jack Morris of Medford and Vernon Craft of Grants Pass at halfbacks and Wayne Berry of La Grande at fullback. This quartet clicked off the biggest gains in the scrimmage, which concluded the afternoon drill.

Mabee has scheduled a full-length scrimmage for Saturday to complete the first week's practices. Sunday the squad will draw a breather and then begin final preparations Monday.

The game will open the 1950 football season when the stars clash with the Portland All-Stars here at Multnomah stadium Saturday night, August 26. Net proceeds go to the Northwest unit of the Shrine's hospital for crippled children.

Aussies Take Net Victory

BROOKLINE, Mass., Aug. 18 (AP)—Australian Davis Cup stars Jack Bromwich and Frank Sedgeman called upon their artistic loquacity to defeat third-seeded Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, and Herb Flam of Beverly Hills, Calif., 4-6, 6-4, 6-2, 7-5, to gain the semi-finals of the national doubles tennis tournament today at Longwood.

After dropping the opening set while fireballing with the American pair, Bromwich and Sedgeman softened their strokes. Their lobs lured Seixas and Flam into storming the net and getting split by passing shots.

During the 11th game of the final set, Seixas gashed his left eyelid with his own racket and had to halt for first-aid treatment. The impressive triumph moved the Australians against their countryman, Ken McGregor, and Tony Trabert of Cincinnati, who ousted Hal Burrows of Charlottesville, Va., and Straight Clark of Pasadena, Calif., 17-15, 3-6, 6-4, 6-3, in the day's other quarter-final.

Gardner Mulloy of Miami, and Bill Talbert of New York, the U.S. Davis Cup aces who are seeking their fifth national doubles titles since 1943, and Harry Hopman of Australia, and Seymour Greenberg of Chicago, became the upper half's semi-finalists.

Haefner, Clark Tied In Eastern Golf Open

BALTIMORE, Aug. 18 (AP)—Clayton Haefner, the North Carolina golfer with a bulging waistline, slowed down today and lean Jimmie Clark pulled up even with him at the half-way mark of the eastern open. Clark stroked a sizzling 66 to tie Haefner for 36 holes at 137, seven better than par.

Haefner, who set a Mount Pleasant course record of 65 yesterday, couldn't beat par 72 on his second go-round. A stroke behind the two leaders in the 72-hole tourney were Henry Ransom, the 39-year-old Texan, and Johnny Palmer of Baden, N.C. Ransom equaled Haefner's record of 65 to post behind his opening 73. Palmer stayed steady at 69 for both rounds, topping it off with a 30-foot putt birdie on the 18th.

Clark, a 29-year-old newcomer to the money golf circuit from Huntington Beach, Calif., posted his 66 behind a 71.

Russian 'Futbol' Players Get Wrists Slapped for Roughness

MOSCOW, Aug. 18 (AP)—The all-union committee on physical culture and sports has cracked down—but hard—on the referees, managers and players who took part in a "rough" soccer game.

(Soccer—or futbol—is to the Russians what baseball is to American fans and this was the equivalent of a super-charged rumberb paralleling in the recent explosion in America's National league between Leo Durocher's New York Giants and the Philadelphia Phillies. What the Giants are to the Phillies, the Kiev Dynamos are to the Moscow Spartans in the current Soviet football race.)
