**Eugene's Ruth Ray Women's Champ Youthful Shotgun Star Captures Coveted Title**

VANDALIA, O., Aug. 22--(AP) Joe Devers, 19-year-old crack shot from Dayton, O., and Eiko, Nev., today won the North American clay target championship, one of the most coveted titles in trapshooting.

The youngster broke 200 targets in a row and 25 more in a shoot-off to defeat about 500 of the country's outstanding marksmen in the day's feature attraction at the 51st grand American trap shoot. Young Devers feat climaxed one of the most sensational days of scoring the big trap shoot has ever witnessed. In addition to the three marksmen who broke all 200 targets, 17 others broke 199, 18 broke 198 and 33 cracked 197.

Arnold Reigger of Seattle, Wash., and Dr. G. A. Roose of Salem, O., broke 200 straight to tie Devers, but Reigger, the defending champion, missed once in the shoot-off and Roose missed three times.

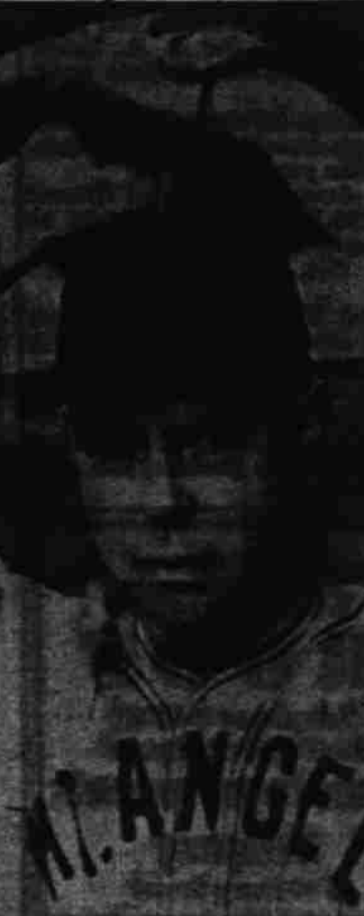
Earlier today, Mrs. Cal Ray, 120 pounds of straight shooting dynamite from Eugene, Ore., broke 199 of 200 to win the women's North American clay target championship.

The score was two targets ahead of any ever fired in the feminine event since it was inaugurated 22 years ago.

Mrs. Ray, who has been shooting only three years, finished two targets ahead of Joan Fluigger, the 19-year-old North Miami, Fla., girl who yesterday broke 190 straight and then outshot five rivals in a 75-target shootoff to become the first woman to capture the overall championship of champions race.

**'Sugar' Risks Title Friday**

**He'll Defend Middle 'Toga' Against Basora**

SCRANTON, Pa., Aug. 22--(AP) Sugar Ray Robinson arrived in Scranton today for his final workout preparatory to his defense of his middleweight title (Pennsylvania version) Friday against Puerto Rico's Jose Basora.

The Harlem slugger, who also holds the world welterweight championship, went two fast rounds against Rego Dell, a Scranton middleweight and appeared to be in tip-top condition.

Robinson didn't go on the scales but he said he weighs about 153 and won't enter the ring any lighter. He'll probably concede a pound or two to Basora.

The champion made it clear that he doesn't consider Basora a pushover. "That guy is a good puncher," Robinson asserted, recalling that in their only previous meeting Basora held him to a 10-round draw. That bout was in Philadelphia in 1945.

Basora was expected to arrive tonight and will work out tomorrow.

Robinson won an easy 15-round decision over Charley Fusari Aug. 9 in defending his welterweight championship. Friday's bout will mark Robinson's 116th professional appearance. He has lost once -- to NBA-middleweight champion Jake Lamotta.
