

First off, we recall three clouts against the scoreboard and believe those three are the only ones in actual competition since the park was built in 1940. Bill (Bucky) Harris, the 1940 Senator first-baseman and outfielder drove a high fly against the upper region of the scoreboard just below the Bishop ad and was given a suit of clothes for the feat by the Bishop firm. In 1941 Big Ed Coleman as a pinch-hitter slammed another high fly that dented the big "4" in the inning line on the beard, and he too won a suit of clothes. Ed had to wait a long time to collect it, as you may recall that he had just joined the Senators that day, was badly out of shape and just about collapsed as he galloped into third base on the hit. He had to be taken from the game and only minutes later had a temperature of 104 and a very serious case of pneumonia. Coleman was hospitalized for weeks.

Greco Mastered the Last One

The third shot against the board came off the bat of Greco three seasons back, and Bishop's again kicked through with a suit. As for Jolley hitting the target, we don't recall it as having happened in a game. Big Smudge may have conked it during batting practice (Greco has done this two or three times, as have other sluggers in years gone by), but didn't do it in a game, we're sure.

A few drives have cleared the center field wall in the near vicinity of the board—Dick Sinovic, Wimpy Quinn, Ed Stewart, Bill Burgher and Pete Hughes mastered same among those we remember—and all would have hit the board had they been over a few feet one way or the other. But the blows by Harris, Coleman and Grece are the only ones we recall as having hit above the catwalk on the scareboard or Bishop sign.
