Squads Pick Captains, Await Saturday Clash

PORTLAND, Aug. 23—(P)—Keith Donahoe, Klamath Falls center, and Jack Morris, Medford half-back, Wednesday were elected captains of the Oregon All-Stars for Saturday night's third annual Shriners' hospital football game.

The Portland team elected Kaye Booth, Franklin quarterback, and Cliff York, Roosevelt center, as their captains in the gridiron classic.

The two teams completed their heavy drills with a practice session this morning.

In the afternoon the players and coaches visited the Shriners hospital for crippled children, which institution receives all net proceeds from the game.

They were greeted by a sea of smiling faces at the hospital. The players spent several hours entertaining and chatting with the kids and autographing their guest books.

The big attraction was Al Hansen, the Grant fullback who will carry a big share of the Portland offensive burden Saturday night. Hansen is a former patient at the hospital.

Most of the state players found patients from their own home towns. Morris and Leo Parker, Medford tackle, were surprised to learn that one youngster from their home town had followed their high school careers and had listened to every Medford game last fall.

Chalk talks and signal drills are all that remain for the two squads prior to their third meeting in a series which now stands at one victory apiece.

Greco Tops in Homers, RBPs

Stetter Drops Points, But Clings to Lead

Although he lost 13 points during the week Glenn (Jeep) Stetter of Spokane continued to lead the Western International league's batting parade through games of last Sunday with a .367 average, nine points ahead of the 358 possessed by Dick Greco, Tacoma's mighty man. Stetter suffered his loss by getting only three hits in 23 times at bat against Wenatchee and Yakima pitching.

Greco rose to a more solid second by plating Salem pitching during the week for 12 hits in 31 tries. Greco also had 11 runs batted during the week to swell his leading total to 131, far ahead of the field. Yakima's Jim Westlake had 105 and Tri-City's Jim Warner eight 103.

Greco also conked three home runs during the week to push his total for the season to an even 30. Gene Thompson of Victoria held second with 22 round-trippers.

Wisconsin Ace Shoot Victor

VANDALIA, O., Aug. 23—(P)—Vic Reinders, the shooting professor from Waukesha, Wis., today won the class AA championship at the 51st Grand American trapshoot in one of the longest shoot-offs in history.

The University of Wisconsin professor broke 200 straight clays from 16 yards to tie four other hot shots for the laurels, and then broke another 150 in a row to take the title. Joe Hiestand, the farm boy from Hillsboro, O., who has won practically everything in the trapshooting game, finished second when he missed his 133rd target in the extra heat. Third place went to Art Finney, Mantato, Minn., fourth to Homer Clark, sr., Alton, Ill., and fifth to John F. Kurth, Columbus, Wis. All broke 200 straight in the regular event.

M. R. Jinkins of Montrose, Ia., a 42-year-old contractor competing in his second Grand American, won the class A championship with 200 straight.
