

Group Eyes Solon Deal; New Price \$50,000 Phils Top Bums; Tigers Up Lead

Salem Senator Business Manager George Emigh announced last night that he had been approached by an unnamed group in regard to possible purchase of the Solon franchise and the Waters park property.

Emigh's announcement came on the heels of an Associated Press dispatch from Kennebec, Wash., which quoted Portland Beaver General Manager Bill Mulligan as saying that the Solon club and park is up for sale at \$50,000.

Mulligan, at Kennebec to watch the final game of the ser-

ies between the Tri-City Braves and the Senators (the Solons lost 13-3) told Don Becker, Tri-City Herald sports editor, that "Portland has decided not to operate a club in Salem next year.

Mulligan's remarks were to the effect that if no parties come forth to buy the club the franchise will be moved probably to New Westminster, B. C.

The Senators, plagued by lack of playing talent, have been in the second division of the Western International loop almost all season and for the past two weeks have resided in the cellar. As a result attendance has

fallen to new lows and that lack of support at the gate is implied as the reason behind the Portland desire to pull out.

Last season at approximately this time a similar situation existed and the Beavers, displaying a hankering to jerk the franchise, put the club and park up for sale at around \$50,000. Several local groups approached Mulligan about a purchase and the price finally levelled off at \$45,000 — but no deal was consummated.

The group which approached Emigh Friday asked to remain unidentified. How far the latest

overtures would go Emigh would not comment about but he said the group seemed to have sound backing.

The Associated Press dispatch from Kennebec reported Becker as saying he understood the other seven clubs in the league had agreed to let Portland take the franchise to New Westminster if the Beavers are unsuccessful in selling the club.

New Westminster was picked because of a hot hockey rivalry between that town and Vancouver, B. C. and Victoria, B. C., both of which have teams in the W.I.L. Becker said. He explained that

Mulligan hopes the hockey rivalry would swing over into baseball and be a good gate attraction.

All three are in the Pacific Coast Hockey League.

The prospect of local purchase of the Senators brightens with the new — and lower — price tag put on the club. However, a deterrent could be the international situation and the possibility there may be no league next season.

The Salem school board had been reported interested in Waters park itself but no positive moves have been made to date.

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—(P)—The Philadelphia Phillies won their most important game of the season tonight.

Reeling under a five-game losing streak, and their comfortable league-leading margin in jeopardy, the "whiz kids" came through with a 4 to 3 victory over the challenging Brooklyn Dodgers.

The clutch win increased their lead to 8½ games over the first three games of the series only to see their hopes dashed by Russ Meyer's six-hit pitching.

Hurling his first complete game since July 5th, the 27-year-old righthander posted his eighth victory, the third over Brooklyn, against 11 defeats. First Baseman Eddie Waitkus paced the Phil's eight hit attack against loser Eddy Palica and Dan Bankhead with two doubles and a single, driving in two runs.

In the American league, the Detroit Tigers nipped the Chicago White Sox, 3-2, on Vic Wertz's ninth-inning hit to move a half game ahead of the New York Yankees in the American league scramble.

Veteran Dizzy Trout went the distance for the Tigers, winning his 12th game. Lefty Bob Cain was the loser.

The St. Louis Browns all but crushed Cleveland's pennant hopes by sweeping a doubleheader from the Indians, 5-4 and 6-0.

The Washington Senators whipped the Philadelphia Athletics, 10-4, and Warren Spahn pitched the Boston Braves to a 4-3 triumph over the New York Giants in the other action.

The Chicago-Cincinnati twilight doubleheader and the St. Louis-Pittsburgh game were postponed because of rain. The Yankees and Boston Red Sox were idle.

The Browns won the first game on Ken Wood's single in the ninth. St. Louis overcame a 4-0 Cleveland advantage, pilled up in the first inning.

In the second game, home runs by Ken Wood and Ray Coleman gave Don Johnson, who hurled seven-hit ball, his fifth victory. Twenty-game winner Bob Lemon dropped his 10th game.

Pep Loses Feather Gonfalon to Saddler

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—(P)—Willie Pep, a disconsolate little figure, lost the featherweight championship of the world to Sandy Saddler at Yankee stadium tonight as he sat on his stool between rounds with a dislocated shoulder.

Apparently on his way to a one-sided victory over the skinny-legged Negro, the great little battler from Hartford, Conn., took a huge crowd of 35,000 completely by surprise when he failed to come up for the eighth round and Referee Ruby Goldstein raised Saddler's arm in token of victory.

Saddler thus regained the title he lost to Pep 19 months ago at Madison Square Garden after having previously dethroned Pep in October of 1948.

The "Hardtops," one of the latest and most thrilling types of track competition, makes its Salem debut tonight as 30 drivers and cars, top performers this year at the Portland Meadows and Sea-Tav ovals, converge on Hollywood Bowl for a program which will be featured by a 35-lap main event run. The show also will include a 20-lap Class B mainer, several heat races, a three-lap trophy dash and the time trials which will start at 8 o'clock.
