

Another gift item is the house slipper from Yugoslavia, called "priglavci" or "people's slipper," a native accessory for many cen-turies. They are ankle high, have soft thin leather soles, and are easily packed, which make them good traveling shoes. Folk-

lore from the different villages inspires the designs on these slippers, and colors are worked in gay combinations of beige, red and green for fleecy styles. Some villages make allower of the villages make slippers of im-pregnated hemp worked in a circular pattern.

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
