

Church Union Appeal Slated By Dr. Jones

The appeal for a federal union of American churches will be presented in Salem Sunday afternoon by Dr. E. Stanley Jones, famed missionary who has led the crusade for three years.

The public meeting will be at 3 o'clock in the senior high school auditorium.

Dr. Jones will come here from Corvallis, where he is to speak Sunday morning, and will leave after the meeting for Portland to speak in the civic auditorium at 8 p. m. Sunday. The Oregon Council of Churches is sponsoring his several talks in the state.

The proposal of the Crusade for a United Church calls for a single church, with Baptist, Lutheran, Methodist and other branches. These are compared to states under the federal government. Each would be able to retain its singular requirements or customs but would not be able to impose them on other denominations as a price of merger.

This is the first Salem appearance by Dr. Jones, who has been a missionary to India for 42 years, since just prior to World War II.

Portlander Buys Capital City Laundry

R. A. Rawlinson of Portland has purchased the Capital City laundry and cleaners, 1264 Broadway st., he reported Wednesday.

Rawlinson bought the plant from the estate of Thomas A. Windishar, who died recently, and from Rudolph Windishar of McMinnville and Van Weider of Salem. The Windishars have operated the laundry since 1920.

Rawlinson said he has been in the laundry business "most of my life." He operated his own laun-

dry and dry cleaning plant in Portland for 15 years. He served with the navy in World War II and since then has been in the cattle-raising business in eastern Oregon.

His family, including Mrs. Rawlinson, an older son and daughter, both at University of Oregon, and a younger daughter in grade school, will move to Salem soon, he said.

Rawlinson said he plans no change in personnel at the plant and no major changes in operation.

"I have visited laundry plants all over the nation in the past few months," said Rawlinson. "The Capital City plant is one of the best. My family and I have picked Salem because we enjoy living here. We hope to continue to maintain and improve the high standards of the plant."

Youth Given Warning on Curfew, Bikes

Salem's youth got a double-barreled warning from city police Wednesday to observe the curfew and not ride bicycles on sidewalks. Police Chief Clyde A. Warren ordered patrolmen to be alert for violators of either city ordinance. The curfew directs that children under 18 must be off the streets by 10:30 p. m. unless accompanied

by adults. On Saturdays and Sundays the hour is extended until midnight. Youngsters 16 and 17 may legally be out in public alone until midnight any time.

The curfew ordinance specifies fines up to \$250 for parents of guardians of children who violate it.

Barkley Asked To Salem Rally

State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson Wednesday sent a letter to Vice-President Alben W. Barkley, urging him to attend and speak at a democratic rally to be held in the Salem armory October 13.

The democrats in Oregon have made wonderful progress in the last two years and while Oregon is still considered to be a republican stronghold we are all doing everything possible to turn the tide, Pearson advised the vice-president in his letter.

The rally, Pearson said, would honor democratic nominees for the legislature, governorship and for other offices. Pearson said Vice-President Barkley was expected to arrive in the northwest early in October.
