Registration is now underway for women wishing to take the mother and baby care and family health classes being sponsored by Marion county chapter of the American Red Cross.

Prospective students are to call the county health office; or Mrs. Charles Mooney, the home nursing chairman for the Red Cross. The training courses, starting October 4, are to be taught by public health nurses of the Marion county health department and other qualified nurses.

The courses will be given at the new Red Cross headquarters, 434 North High street. The classes consist of six two-hour lessons.

Classes will be taught on Wednesday between 9 a.m. and 11 a.m., and between 2 and 4 p.m.; and on Fridays between 9 and 11 a.m. and between 2 and 4 p.m.

Title of the six lessons are: "Before the Baby Comes," "The Baby is Born," "After the Baby is Born," "The Baby's First Year," "The Child's Health in an Expanded Environment," and "Protection of the Family's Health."

Material for the courses has been prepared by the American Red Cross and approved by the American Medical association, the American Nurses association and other like groups, Mrs. Mooney states.
