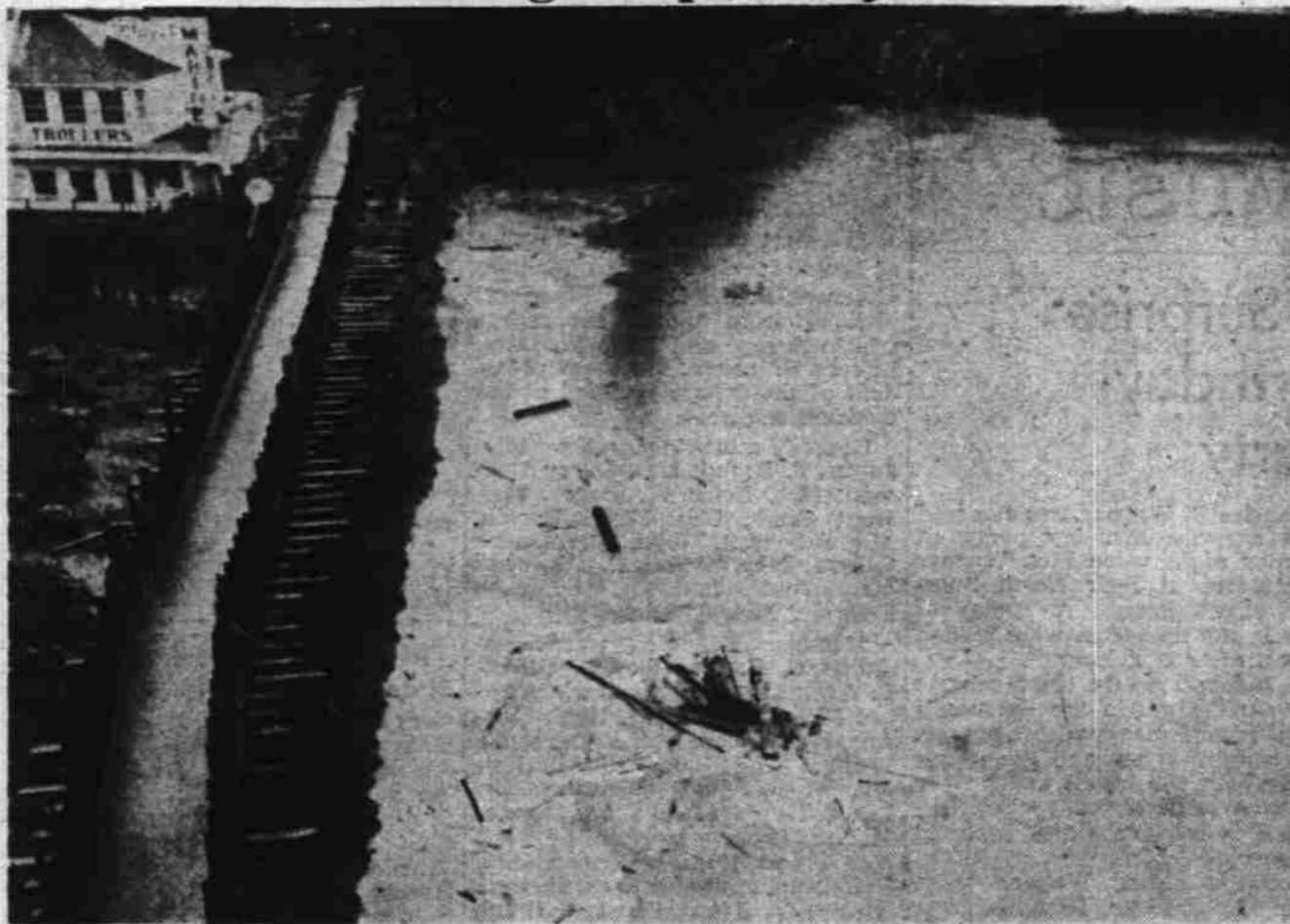

Confidence men—using a football punchboard for a gimmick—clipped a north Salem service station for \$85 Monday.

The first gyp artist sold the operator the board, "a sure-fire

money maker," for \$1.50. The second came along an hour later and won \$160 on it. But he settled for \$85 which reportedly was all the money on hand at the station.

A short time later the proprietor decided he had been bilked and called in city police. He told them the board was designed so that any amount of money could be bet on each punch.

The follow-up man, placing small bets, lost eight times in a row. Then he bet \$2 and drew a slip reading "Army, pays 10-to-1" (\$20). The next time he bet \$7 and drew "Notre Dame" a 20-to-1 winner good for \$140.
