This show is open to any amateur flower grower to make an exhibit and commercial growers may exhibit but not for prizes. Any one making an exhibit must furnish own container and be responsible for same and remove after 9 p. m. Saturday night. No more than five blooms are allowed in specimen entry unless showing buds.

Day's Events Batter Stock Prices Down

NEW YORK, Sept. 26-(AP)—Inflation warnings and dramatic American military successes in Korea combined to batter the stock market down today in the sharpest break since mid-July. The market was weak throughout the day, especially the rails, and when a selling wave hit in the final hour, prices broke widely down the entire list. The quotations tumbled one minute behind floor-transactions during a three-minute period just before the close.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dropped 1.3 to 81.2, the sharpest decline in the average since July 12. The industrial component of the average lost 1.5, rails were down 1.7, and utilities were off 1.1 of a point.

The market broadened out to 1,188 issues of which only 234 were able to advance. Of these, however, 64 made new highs for the year. There were 731 issues on the down side with 4 touching new lows.

Grains Drift, Close Lower

CHICAGO, Sept. 26-(AP)—There wasn't much rallying power in the pits of the board of trade today. With the exception of wheat and soybeans, trading was inclined to drift along.

Wheat worked above the previous close at one time on scattered mill buying against light sales of flour. Some short covering was also noted.

At the close wheat was 1/4 to 1/8 lower, corn was 1/4 to 1/8 lower, oats were 1/4 to 1/8 lower, rye was 1/4 to 1/8 lower and lard was 1/4 to 1/8 lower. Soybeans were 1/4 to 1/8 lower. The July contract in wheat failed to attract buying and was the laggard in that pit. Traders said there was quite a bit of hedging pressure.
