\$2.75, Pound Paid for Lamb At PI Show

PORTLAND, Oct. 11 (AP)—A price of \$2.75 a pound was paid for each of two champion fat lambs sold at auction at the Pacific International Livestock exposition here today.

Richard Harms, 12, Clackamas, received \$264 for his 2-H champion lamb. Ray Sawyer, Moscow, Idaho, realized \$242 for his FFA winner. It was eight pounds lighter than Harms' animal.

A year ago the top FFA lamb brought \$5 a pound, but only \$1.45 was paid for the 4-H champion. The champion 4-H steer, a 1,005 pound Hereford, brought Brent Horn, Pilot Rock, \$1 a pound from the Congress hotel. Top price a year ago was 85 cents a pound.

The grand champion FFA hog, a Duroc Jersey, brought John Schultheis, Colton, Wash., \$1 a pound from the Del Monte Meat company, Portland. Last year's champ sold for \$1.20.

The University of Idaho received \$1 a pound for its open-class champion hog bought by the Multnomah hotel.

The 282 FFA and 4-H steers sold for \$90,058, an average of 33.16 cents a pound. The current market price is 31 cents.

PP&L Stock Put on Block

NEW YORK, Oct. 11 (AP)—Nation-wide syndicate headed by National Securities corp. today offered publicly 1,078,744 shares of common stock of the Pacific Power & Light Co. at \$14 a share.

In mid-afternoon the managers reported the offering received an "excellent reception at the hands of the public and institutional investors," with every major area of the country participating in the purchases.

The stock does not represent new financing Pacific power and the company will receive none of the proceeds. The stock represented part of the shares purchased last February from American Power & Light Co. by an investment group.



CHICAGO, Oct. 11 (AP)—Traders in corn found enough encouragement in a government crop forecast and prospects of export sales to push yellow cereal prices fractionally higher today.
That was about all the strength the market had, however.
Wheat closed 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, corn 1/4 higher, oats 1/4 higher, soybeans 1/4-2/8 lower, and lard 5 cents lower to 8 cents a hundred pounds higher.
Trading in wheat continued at its slow pace. Holland was reported in the market for moderate quantities of hard winter wheat. Rye did little. A little support in lard came from warehouse interests.
