

Soviet Blocks Re-Election Of Trygve Lie

LAKE SUCCESS, Oct. 12 (AP)—The Soviet union today used its veto power in an effort to block the re-election of U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie but legal experts at the U. N. said the assembly might be able to extend his term, possibly for three years.

These experts argued that in cases where the security council is not able to make a recommendation the general assembly could extend the term of the secretary-general. Russia is expected to challenge this position but majority delegates said Lie could be re-elected against Soviet opposition.

Jacob A. Malik, Soviet deputy foreign minister, cast Russia's 46th veto at a closed meeting of the security council against Lie's appointment to a new five year term beginning next February 1.

The council vote was nine in favor of Lie. The Soviet union opposed, and the eleven members, nationalist China, abstained.

Malik then proposed Zygmunt Modzelewski, foreign minister of Poland, for the post and he was promptly voted down by the western powers.

Russia alone voted for Modzelewski. China, Cuba, Ecuador and Yugoslavia opposed him. Six countries abstained: the United

States, Britain, France, Norway, India and Egypt.

Under the U. N. charter, the council must recommend a secretary-general, with the five big powers -- Russia, the United States, France, China and Britain -- voting unanimously for him. The general assembly then must approve the recommendation and fix the term.

Ohio Couple Greets 11th Baby Girl

ATHENS, O., Oct. 12 (AP)—Mrs. Mary Frances Gillette of Stroud's Run, O., celebrated her 35th birthday today — 24 hours after giving birth to her 11th consecutive daughter.

Mrs. Gillette's physician said he thought the Ohio mother had set some sort of record by having 11 girls in 15 years without ever having had a son.

"I don't care much about the record," smiled Mrs. Gillette from her bed in sheltering arms hospital.

Mrs. Gillette, a heavy-set brunette with a ready smile and an utterly relaxed viewpoint on life, said "I don't mind at all" having all girls.

She smiled when someone commented that the father, Harold Lee Gillette, 41, probably was disappointed in not having a son along the line.

"You can't have everything," she said calmly. "He'll just have to be disappointed."

For the benefit of a newspaper reporter, Mrs. Gillette slowly ran down the list of Gillette girls.

"There's Wanda, 14; Virginia, 12; Barbara, 11; Sue, 9; Sharon, 8; Frances, 7; June, 5; Lucy, 4; Bonita — she'll be three in December — and Norma Jean, 14 months.

"And, of course, our new baby. She hasn't been named yet."

The newest Gillette, a healthy, wriggling little girl who weighed seven pounds, 12 ounces, arrived yesterday. Mrs. Gillette observed her 35th birthday today. Tomorrow she goes home to the little six-room frame house in the Stroud's Run community, 11 miles north of Athens in south-east Ohio.

Father Gillette won't around today. He was busy earning a living in the service department of the McBee company in Athens for 11 girls, a wife and a six-room house.

Retail Trade Men Oppose New Controls

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 (AP)—Retail trade representatives today voiced strong opposition to wage-price and rationing controls at present.

They urged that consumer credit curbs be relaxed instead of tightened.

Spokesmen for a number of national retail dealer association told government officials sales have fallen off since the credit curbs were imposed September 16, and that retail prices have declined already "in some areas."

Their protests on the credit curbs came while the federal reserve board was considering action, possibly as early as next week, to make still tougher the controls on installment buying applied in mid-September.
