Cave-In Near Newberg Kills Ditch Digger

NEWBERG, Oct. 12.—Ray Boehmer, about 43, was killed today when buried in a drainage ditch cave-in on the Henry Alberhalden farm near here.

Boehmer was working in a 30-foot cut with Alberhalden when an estimated 10 tons of dirt cascaded down. Alberhalden jumped to safety, but Boehmer was trapped.

The farmer ran a mile to his home and telephoned Marion county police. They in turn summoned the St. Paul and Newberg fire departments.

Firemen dug for two hours before reaching Boehmer's body. Boehmer, who lived at the Ep-por hop yard, St. Paul, is survived by his widow, a step-daughter and a step-son.

Tomorrow an alumni luncheon is scheduled just before the football game, while an evening dance Saturday will close the Homecoming celebration.

150 Millions Needed for Road Projects

It would require \$150,000,000 to cover the cost of highway improvements badly needed in Oregon during the next five years, State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock announced Thursday.

Baldock's estimate followed announcement by the American Road Builders association that a recent survey showed it would cost \$237,944,000 to place main Oregon highways in first-class condition. The association's survey was confined largely to needed work on main federal aid highways included in a long-range program.

A legislative interim committee, following a two-year investigation, reported to the 1949 legislature that state highway requirements would cost the state \$468,839,000 over 15 years.

A number of hold-over legis-

lators have expressed themselves in favor of a bond issue to speed up highway modernization. Outstanding state highway bonds now aggregate only \$500,000.

Baldock said when the 1951-53 highway construction program is outlined the amount of money required for the five year program will be reduced materially. This program cannot be worked out until the state highway commission determines definitely how much federal aid will be available for Oregon highways.

This allocation will not be announced by the U. S. bureau of roads until the official census figures are released, probably early in December.

Bank Loans, Deposits Up In City Banks

Salem bank loans are up 23 per cent and deposits up 8 per cent over last year, the four local banks reported Thursday.

All banks showed gains in both deposits and loans. The totals of their reports were compared with the comparable reports made at this time in 1949. All bank reports also were higher than those made June 30.

Reporting were the Willamette Valley bank, the Salem branch of First National Bank of Portland and (combined) the West Salem and Ladd & Bush-Salem branches of U. S. National of Portland. Their figures show:

First National bank's statewide statement for 45 banking offices showed deposits of \$494,634,588, loans of \$217,575,018 and total resources of \$536,202,820. These figures were all up from the 1949 figures. First National said it has adopted a policy of making quarterly statements, regardless of the time of calls from the comptroller of currency.

U. S. National bank, with 40 branches, showed a total of \$571,080,892 in deposits, \$181,660,182 and \$611,229,461 in total resources. All totals represented gains over 1949. The bank said its deposit figure was the third largest ever recorded in Oregon banking history.
