STAYTON-Linn county crews bave been working to improve the Stayton-Scio road. Biggest im-provement is being carried out at the end nearest the Stayton bridge where the bad curve is ueing eliminated.

A new grade is being given this portion of the road, as far south as the foot of the hill. It will have a top 30 feet wide, of crushed rock, according to W. J. Kelly of Scio,

The road all the way to Scio is seceiving more stone. An estimat-ed 12,000 yards of rock already have been spread, Ira Rinker, erusher superintendent, said.

A gravel bar in the river just above the Stayton bridge is sup-plying rock for the operation. A county-owned portable crusher outfit there is processing the rock. The crusher is expected to con-tinue in operation until high wa-ter. Last Friday saw a rise in the river that put water over most of the bar, but the crushed continued to operate despite water which eovered the lower end of some of its belts.
