McKay Names Committee on Indian Affairs

Appointment of an Indian affairs committee was announced by Gov. Douglas McKay Wednesday.

The committee is composed of two representatives from each of the four reservation tribal councils in the state, two state legislators, two officials of the federal bureau of Indian affairs, three public members and five appointive state officials.

Outstanding among items to be studied, virtually all of which were recommended by the 1950 national governors conference, include:

1. Early and equitable settlement of Indian treaties.
2. Social and economic rehabilitation of the Indian.
3. Equipping the Indian for living in and with American culture through education and training.
4. Encourage the Indian as an individual, to preserve his best traditions as an integral part of American life.
5. Bring an early end to federal wardship with adequate federal aid in the interim.

Public members of the committee are Lew Wallace of Portland, Dr. L. S. Cressman of the University department of anthropology, and Julian (Buck) Smith, Turner, and Indian who starred athletically at Willamette University where he is now studying for his masters degree.

Legislative members include Sen. Phillip S. Hitchcock of Klamath Falls, and Rep. Sprague Carter of Pendleton.

Portland regional office of the bureau of Indian affairs members are E. Morgan Pryse, director, and George Lavatta. Selected by their tribal councils to serve on the committee are Vincent Mercier and Coquille Thompson, Grand Ronde-Siletz reservation; Seldon Kirk and Boyd Jackson, Klamath reservation; Avex Miller and Vernon Jackson, Warm Springs reservation, and Sam Kash and Richard Burke, Umatilla reservation.

State officials on the committee include William Van Meter, deputy state labor commissioner; Lois Howard, state welfare administrator; Dr. Gordon C. Edwards, state board of health; Lee M. Bown, deputy state police superintendent; and Harvey Wright, state director of Indian education.

Valley Men to Attend Farm Loan Conference

Fred Muhs, McMinnville, and Robert Mitchell, Perrydale, will represent the Willamette National Farm Loan association at a four-state conference scheduled October 26 and 27 in Spokane, Wash. The association, with offices at 715 N. Commercial st. in Salem, represents Yamhill, Polk and Marion counties.

Judge Assigned To Lebanon Case

Chief Justice Hall S. Lusk of the state supreme court Wednesday assigned Judge W. G. East, Lane county circuit court, to hear the case of Garland vs. Kirkpatrick in Linn county. The litigation involves an accounting of the estate of the late Sam Garland of Lebanon.

Both Circuit Judges Victor Oliver of Linn county and Fred McHenry of Benton county were disqualified. Judge McHenry will go to Columbia county to hear the murder case of the state vs. Battin.
