

Hoop Season Hits Stride This Week; Top Quints Seek Bradley Tech Toga

Many Upsets Already In Loyola, Dartmouth Victims of Reversals

NEW YORK, Dec. 3 (AP)—Vengeance-bent Bradley, which twice last season failed by one game of winning a post-season basketball tournament, is back on the victory trail today—but it looks like a long and treacherous one for the Peoria, Ill., Braves.

For one, everybody—and that includes CCNY's "Grand-Slam Kids"—will be gunning for Forrest Anderson's squad rated No. 1 in the final Associated Press poll last March.

Secondly, the loss of All-American Paul Umsh and Mike Chianak as a rebounders deluxe—is bound to hurt the Braves.

Bradley won 32 and lost five games last season, capturing the Missouri Valley title. Six lettermen are back, including Gene (Squeaky) Melchiorre, the sensational five-foot-eight pivot man. Melchiorre poured in 24 points Saturday night as Bradley opened its 32-game schedule with a 94-73 romp over Houston.

Bradley faces a busy week, playing three games. Tuesday it will be Wayne university and Thursday Oregon State. Then comes the big battle Saturday with highly-rated DePaul in the Chicago stadium.

The hoop game hit on almost all cylinders Saturday night—and already a batch of upsets are in the book. Miami of Ohio triumphed Michigan 44-36; Wheaton tripped Loyola of Chicago, 62-60; and Centenary upended Rice, 62-54.

Brigham Young and CCNY tangle Tuesday night in Madison Square Garden.

This week, while it is the season's first full one, promises to be one of the best.

DePaul travels to Stillwater Wednesday for the annual struggle with Oklahoma A & M and the same evening, Texas will be at Oklahoma trying to solve the Sooners.

Other top games include: Yale at Penn, Purdue at Kentucky, Chicago Loyola at Minnesota, Tulane at Rice, Oregon at UCLA, Iowa at Michigan, Western Kentucky at Cincinnati, Syracuse at Penn State and Oregon State at Indiana.

Molalla Plans Gym Inaugural

MOLALLA, Dec. 3 (Special)—Molalla high's new basketball pavilion will be inaugurated Friday, December 8, with two games. The Molalla Indians, coached by Budd Gronquist, and the Mt. Angel Preps, mentored by Gene Barrett, will clash in the prep game. The Lewis & Clark Pioneers of Portland and the Oregon College of Education Wolves of Monmouth meet in the collegiate fixture.

A dedication ceremony is planned for Friday also.

Although both Molalla and Mt. Angel are in the Willamette Valley league, their game of Friday will not count in the standings. The counting games will be played at Mt. Angel December 19 and here January 26.

The Willamette Valley league jamboree is booked for the new gym Friday, December 15, with eight teams participating.
