## Parolee Given 18-Month Term At State Pen

Vincent T. Shanley is back in the state prison today after a short parole freedom.

Marion County Circuit Judge George Duncan sentenced Shanley to a maximum of 18 months in the state prison after Shanley pleaded guilty to a charge of carrying a concealed weapon.

Shanley was paroled from prison on the morning of November 30. He was arrested that night in a night club north of Salem by a Marion county deputy sheriff. He was carrying a loaded automatic pistol.

Prior to his arrest, back-tracking deputies found, Shanley had secured the guns at an Independence store. When he left the store he tied up owner Earl Corde, his wife and young son. Corde said this week he would press robbery charges against Shanley.

Shanley was committed to the state prison in 1949 on two concurrent five-year sentences on bad check charges.

## Protective Tariff Proposal Endorsed by Nut Growers

Members of the Nut Growers Society of Washington and Oregon at their final session in Salem Friday passed a resolution urging congressmen to work for passage of the Morse-Magnuson amendment aimed at protection from the "uncontrolled importation of foreign nuts."

Also through resolution, Oregon and Washington state colleges will be urged to make more extensive experiments and demonstrations in permanent cover crops and pasturing sheep. This, the society hoped, would be done on both irrigated and non-irrigated lands in an aim at gaining a greater erosion control.

Considerable time was spent Friday in discussing various diseases and other troubles of nuts, particularly walnuts. While mushroom root rot is on the increase, there is still no cause for alarm about this, P. W. Miller, plant pathologist USDA, stated. Injury has not been serious so far, he added.

Average cost of producing a pound of filberts, orchard run, was 14.4 cents in 1949. G. W. Kuhlman, agriculture economist, reported from a study of 99 filbert farms. Total cost per acre averaged \$162.86, he said. Largest one item under this was labor which accounted for \$69.32.

Some growers however reported cost of production per pound less than 10 cents per pound.

In a panel discussion led by M. C. Huber of the state college, growers disclosed that machinery was rapidly replacing hand harvest. Had machinery not been used this year, many growers would

not have been harvested at all because of the heavy rains, growers stated.

## Rudd Heads Retail Trade Study Group

M. B. Rudd, manager of the J. C. Penney Co. store in Salem, will head a committee of 15 local business men studying relations between retail merchants and the Salem Chamber of Commerce.

Makeup of the committee will be five representatives of the chamber board of directors, five of the Retail Trade bureau and one each of the Capitol Shopping center and business districts in north, east, south and west Salem.

Closer ties between the chamber and the trade bureau and various proposed retail functions of the chamber will be studied

## Flax Company To Need More Employees

Employment will be approximately doubled at the westside Flax Textile plant when a \$300,000 expansion and improvement program is completed early next year, according to J. R. Millar, president of National Automotive Fibres, Inc.

The Salem plant, a subsidiary of the corporation, manufactures the "Flaxtex" line of all-linen rugs and carpeting.

The expansion includes a new open-span building, now under construction, which will double manufacturing floor space. The company also has installed new English-made flax textile machinery.

The company uses flax grown in the Salem area in the manufacture of its floor coverings.

## Extra Hours Set at Postoffice Today

Although it's almost too late for "early" Christmas shopping, Salem postoffice will be open extra hours today for sale of stamps and mailing of packages.

Those windows will be staffed from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m., three hours later than usual. All other windows will close at noon, and no mail to Salem recipients will be given out after that time.
