Baker's Wife Wins \$25,000 Baking Prize

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (AP)—A baker's wife with a recipe of her own won the \$25,000 first prize today in a national recipe and baking contest.

The award was presented to the gray-haired, motherly Mrs. Peter Wuebel of Redwood City, Calif., by the Duchess of Windsor at a celebrity-clustered luncheon in the Waldorf-Astoria hotel. She baked what she called an orange "kiss me cake."

A \$5,000 junior first prize in the contest, sponsored by Pillsbury Mills, was won by 17-year-old Mrs. Bernard Dorosseau of Rice Lake, Wis., who married at 15 and is the mother of two children. She baked cookies known as "cherry winks."

One hundred contestants from 12 to 76 years old from 36 states the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico stood before 100 electric gloves to bake their recipes in the finals of the contest yesterday in the Waldorf grand ballroom.

Mrs. Wuebel's recipe: "Orange Kiss Me Cake"

Bake at 350 degrees fahrenheit for 30 to 35 minutes.

Makes 13 by 9 by 2 inch cake. Two cups flour sifted. One teaspoon soda. One teaspoon salt. One-half cup shortening. One cup sugar.

Two eggs. One large orange (reserve juice for topping; grind rind and pulp with raisins).

One cup raisins ground. One cup milk. The topping consists of one-quarter cup sugar, one teaspoon cinnamon, one-quarter cup walnuts, chopped.

Sift together flour, soda and salt. Cream shortening and sugar. Blend in eggs, one at a time. Add ground orange and raisins. Add milk and dry ingredients alternately to creamed mixture, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Blend thoroughly after each addition (with electric mixer use low speed). Pour into well-greased and lightly-floured 13 by 9 by 2 inches pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit) 30 to 35 minutes. Drip orange juice (about one-third cup) over warm cake. Sprinkle with sugar, cinnamon and nut topping. Decorate with orange slices.

However, he has consistently been aligned in congress with the states rights democrats and has opposed many administration measures. 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Research on Cancer Starts At Oregon State

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — Research on the relationship of a body chemical, nucleic acid, to tissue growth and cancer, is being conducted at Oregon State college by Dr. E. J. Dornfeld, professor of zoology, under a \$4,000 American Cancer society grant.

Nucleic acids and related body chemicals are vitally concerned in growth processes of cells, Dr. Dornfeld explains. Since cancer is a form of abnormal growth, the zoologist is interested in learning more about these substances. Developing rat ovaries are used in the research.

Dr. Dornfeld says that nucleotides are formed when nucleic acids break down. When added to the growth mixture they were found to restrain cell division. This opens up a new possibility to halt the spread of cancer, Dr. Dornfeld explains. He adds that evidence suggests that x-ray treatments for cancer involves the production of such growth-blocking nucleotides.

Work along this line is now being continued with special attention to other compounds related to nucleic acids and to the proteins and enzymes associated with them. Technical accounts of these investigations will appear in early editions of the Anatomical Record and the Journal of Experimental Zoology.

This is the second year that Dr. Dornfeld has received research assistance from the American Cancer society. Only two other grants, both to the University of Oregon medical school, were made in Oregon this year.

Working with Dr. Dornfeld on this research are Charles G. Ross, a University of Pennsylvania graduate research assistant, and Frank M. Wilson, Corvallis, and John Rosinsky, Lakefield, Minn., graduate students.

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Clackamas Draft Board Chairman Quits in Protest

OREGON CITY, Ore., Dec. 12 (AP)—Clackamas county draft board chairman M. S. Schrock of Milwaukie has resigned, protesting interference by a state selective service aide in the operation of the county board.

Schrock said Sherman Sawtelle of the state office had found fault with the clerical staff. Schrock said the errors Sawtelle found were minor and the result of government red tape.

Col. Francis Mason, deputy state selective service director, said Schrock's resignation would have to be accepted by President Truman.

Consumers Rebuke Milk Control Law

PORTLAND, Dec. 12 (AP)—A consumers' committee Monday charged the Oregon milk control law was administered to benefit the industry without regard to consumers.

The affiliated milk committee released letters it sent to the state board of agriculture and Governor Douglas McKay. The group said "the public integrity of the state is being risked for poundage fees from a privileged minority of the milk industry under a shallow administrative disguise."

It criticized Milk Administrator T. L. Ohlsen for refusing to grant lower prices for milk sold over the counters of retail stores.

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Attlee Reports To Commons In Conference

LONDON, Dec. 12 (AP)—Prime Minister Attlee said today he has good hopes that United Nations troops will hold out in Korea and is completely satisfied with President Truman's position on the use, or non-use, of the atom bomb.

He have good hopes that the forces of the United Nations will maintain themselves in Korea," he told a cheering house of commons.

Reporting on his man-to-man talks with President Truman in Washington, the prime minister also said Britain and the United States are ready at any time to enter with Russia into "genuine discussions" aimed at resolving east-west differences.

The prime minister was closeted with King George VI and later with his cabinet soon after his plane landed in London. Then he hastened to the house of commons, where he received a warm, non-partisan "welcome home."

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Joseph Kennedy Calls U.S. Foreign Policy 'Suicidal'

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., Dec. 12 (AP)—Joseph P. Kennedy, former ambassador to Great Britain, said tonight our foreign policy is "suicidal" and "has made us no foul weather friends."

Kennedy also charged U. S. foreign policy has "solidified communism," sapped our economic strength, failed to provide a strong defense in this hemisphere and is "politically and morally a bankrupt policy."

He proposed the United States get out of Korea and any other place in Asia where we cannot hope to hold our defense, and to stop wasting our resources in an idle attempt "to hold the line of the Elbe or the line of the Rhine."

Kennedy gave his views in a speech prepared for the University of Virginia law school forum.

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
