

Business at Postoffice in Seasonal Climb

Business is rushing through both doors, and Salem postoffice is getting more crowded every day.

Postmaster Albert C. Gragg said 61,000 pieces of mail were handled Monday, compared with 65,000 on the comparable Monday last year, which was a day nearer Christmas.

One help to stamp buyers, instead of waiting in lines at the window, is to use the stamp-vending machine in the lobby, which operates on nickels and dimes only. Three-cent stamps (five for a nickel and a dime) are recommended for greeting cards, because they bring preferred handling and delivery, along with forwarding service if needed. Two-cent stamps take mail at advertising circular treatment, with only one attempt at delivery before the "dead letter office."

The postoffice also urged use of return addresses on envelopes. The practice is approved by etiquette authorities because it helps friends keep their lists up to date and assures return of cards if not deliverable.

Since directory service has been discontinued, letters must carry full addresses or they will not be delivered.

If you're still wrapping gift parcels, the postmaster observed, you should send them special handling or by air parcel post to be sure of beating Santa.

Christmas cards for out-of-state delivery should be on their way by this Friday and local cards by Monday.

Postal workers will be grateful if you'll tie your cards in bundles with all envelopes facing the same way and the stamps in the same corner.

Clear, accurate, and complete addresses will save your Christmas cards time-consuming detours. "And if your handwriting isn't completely legible, please print," the postmaster added. "Many cards must be delivered by temporary employees who lack a veteran mail carrier's patient skill in puzzling out uncertain abbreviations and penmanship."
