

Morse Says 'We Can't Win War with China'

NEW YORK, Dec. 13—(AP)—Sen. Morse (R-Ore) said Tuesday that if Russia involves America in a war with China "we cannot win that war."

He told a radio audience the United States should inform Russia "that we stand ready to negotiate an honorable peace."

But, Morse added, the U. S. also should warn the Soviet "We are determined to resist along with our allies in the United Nations a continuation of Russia's aggression through the subterfuge of her satellite countries."

Morse's nation-wide address was aired by ABC on its "America's Town Meeting" program.

The Oregon republican, a member of the senate armed forces committee, said there is much evidence that Russia is trying to involve the U. S. in a war with communist China.

"We cannot win that war," he added, "because even if we sacrifice enough American men on Chinese soil to win that war militarily, I think, in the long run, we would lose it economically because it would bankrupt us over the years to occupy China."

Twin Automatic X-Ray Machine Shows Heart

CHICAGO, Dec. 13—(AP)—A new twin automatic X-ray machine that shows the inside of the heart and blood vessels at work was described Tuesday at the Radiological Society of North America.

Dr. Wendell G. Scott, associate professor of clinical radiology at the Washington university school of medicine, St. Louis, said the technique holds considerable promise.

He said it aids in the accurate diagnosis of the conditions that cause "blue babies" and assists the surgeon in determining whether corrective surgery can be undertaken.

He said it also may lead to a better understanding of different types of heart disease caused by rheumatic fever, high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries and artery changes.

Injected Into Blood
An opaque substance that shows up on an X-ray plate is injected into the blood stream. Then the automatic X-ray machine takes a fast series of pictures of the heart and blood vessels from two directions simultaneously.

This, in effect, permits a doctor to "see" inside the heart and vessels as they perform their work. The twin picture eliminates the need for a second injection of the opaque substance and the discomfort of related examinations. It permits the doctor to study the heart in three dimensions—height, breadth and depth.

Good Results
Two doctors reported good results with a protective grid that permits radiologists to treat deep seated cancers with massive X-ray doses never before administered to humans.

The grid, a protective pad of lead and rubber in which little holes are drilled, was adapted by Dr. Hirsch Marks of the New York City cancer institute. The sieve-like pad is placed on the skin over the tumor when X-rays are applied.

X-ray treatment of cancers in deep organs has been limited by the vulnerability of the healthy skin and surface tissues. The high doses needed can cause such severe skin burns that treatment must be halted prematurely. The perforated pad limits the burn to tiny spots in a treated area.

Emergency Edict Doesn't Mean M-Day

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13—(AP)—Military reservists all over the country are asking: "What happens to us if President Truman declares a national emergency?"

Defense department officials, asked to clarify the situation, expressed the following views:

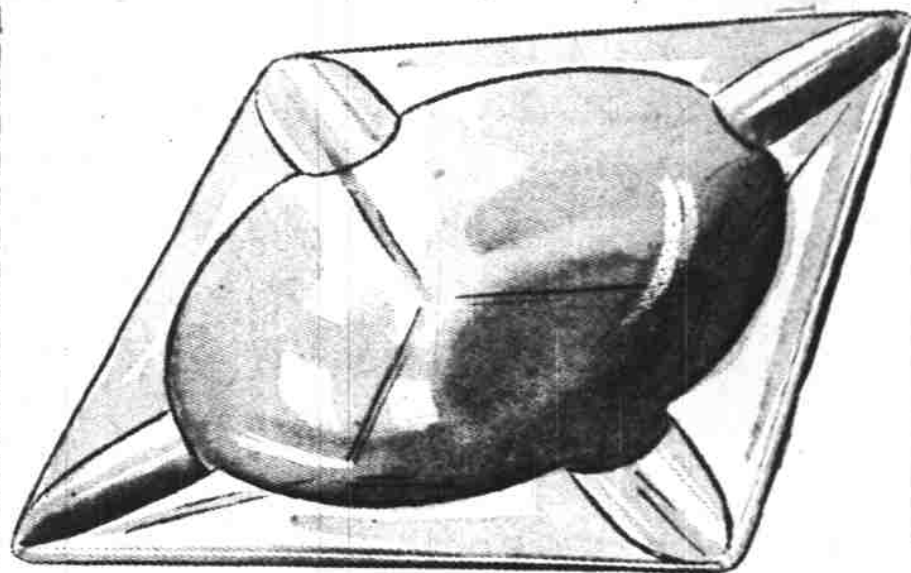
1. The October "slow-down" policy in calling reserves to active duty, though technically still in effect, is not being carried out as originally planned, because of the pressure of events in Korea.

2. If a national emergency is declared, this might be the occasion for throwing the "slow-down" policy out the window entirely.

3. But a declaration of national emergency would not, in itself, require reservists to report for active duty. It would not automatically mean the mobilization of reservists. The army, navy and air force would continue to use their regular procedures, each service calling up men according to its needs.

That statement should relieve the minds of some reservists who had the impression that a national emergency declaration would automatically put them on active duty within 24 hours.

The procedure for the three major branches of the armed services also would apply to the coast guard concerning a call-up of men. The coast guard normally operates under the treasury department but could be placed by presidential order under the direction of the navy, as it was in World War II.



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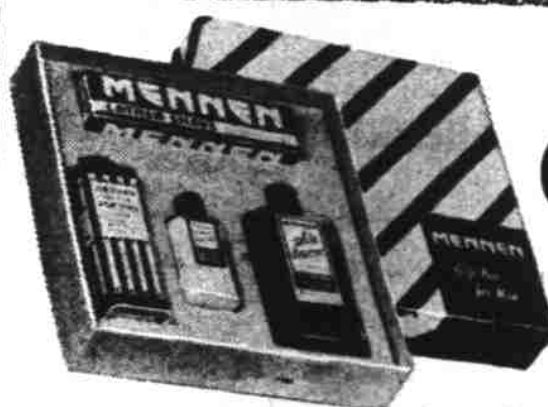
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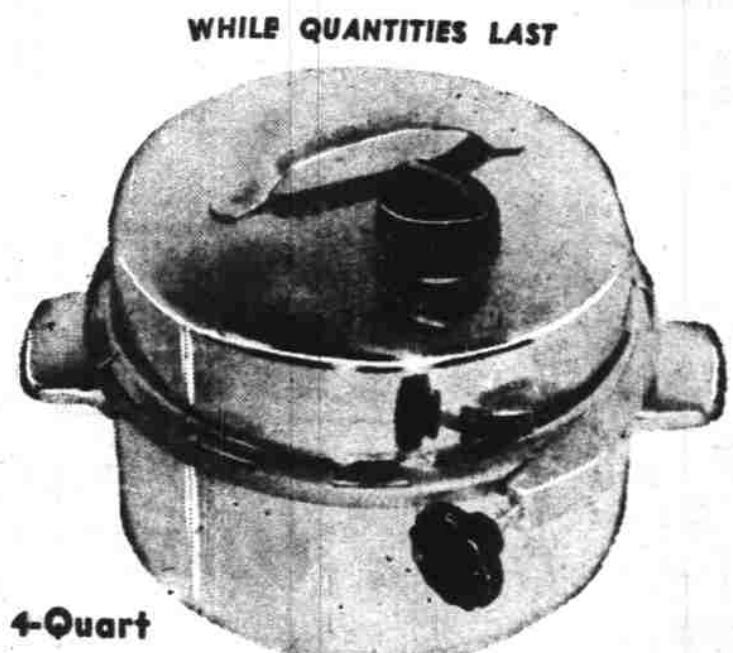
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
