## More for Your Money In Dressing Up Windows for Holidays, Follow Simple Rules for Buying Fabric

If you are thinking of dressing up your windows for the holidays — and many readers have been writing me about the problems of making their own drapes — it is a good idea to follow some simple basic rules.

A novice at drape making will find a wealth of fabrics in piece goods departments of local stores, but before planning any home sewing project like this, make sure the colors you want will harmonize with those in your home. Judge patterns and textures carefully. A modern, rough textured fabric might catch your eye, but if your living room is done in a Colonial period, you are better off with a chintz. Plain colored drapes are best for rooms with pattern-



ed wall paper. You will probably find that hangings that come right down to the floor are better than shorter ones, unless you have a set of country cottage windows.

There are many tricks you can work out for different effects in drape making. Vertical striped fabric will give height to a low ceiling room. A softer touch is achieved by tie backs or wide ruffled styles.

You can save time with new sewing machine attachments obtainable at your local sewing centers. These include rufflers, edge stitchers, and cording foot. The last will enable you to work in scalloped edges or even Grecian scroll designs after a little practice.

For valances a swag style is a simple drape to make and can be combined with a set of drapes you now have for a new note. You might even progress to covering a valance board for a decorator touch.
