

Complete Roster of Schools, Rules Issued for Marion-Polk County 1951 Spelling Contest

The Oregon Statesman-KSLM 1951 Spelling Contest is all set to go! Seventh and eighth grade students from 105 schools in Marion and Polk counties will participate—and pupils from the only other five schools with those grade levels (two in the Independence-Monmouth district and three parochial schools) also may take part if their schools accept the invitation prior to December 30.

Every school in the two counties, with 7th and 8th grades, was invited. There are no entry fees and nothing to buy, and teachers may choose their own method of finding the school champions.

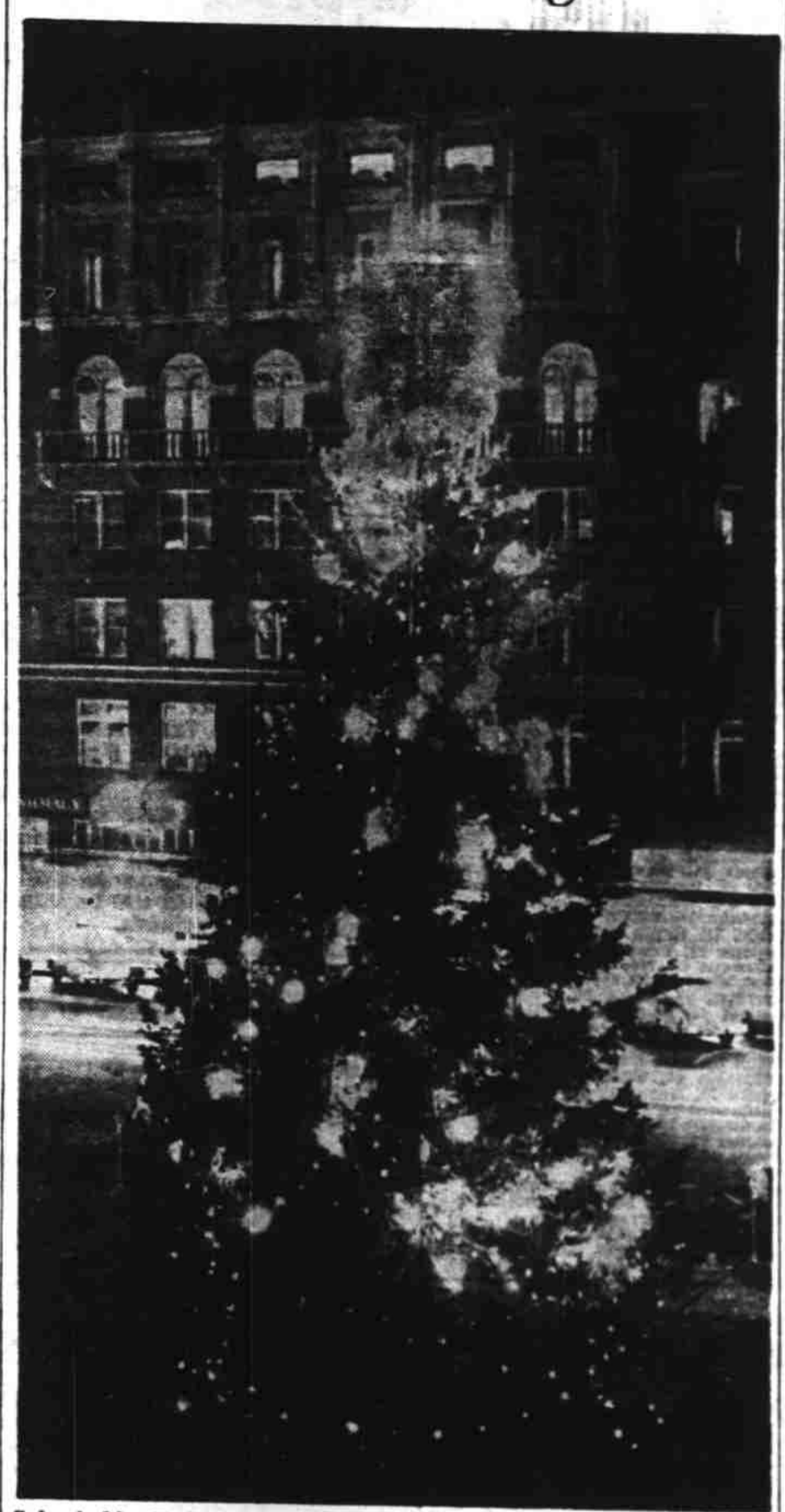

Civil Service Board Asked To Permit Outside Work for Salem Policemen, Firemen

Whether policemen and firemen under Salem civil service should be permitted to accept other employment on off-duty hours was questioned before the city civil service commission Wednesday.

A fireman's representative called attention to the national emergency in which a growing shortage of manpower is anticipated.

Commissioners replied that no change in present city law forbidding outside work is contemplated at this time. They added, however, that the war situation might later demand some letup of its strict enforcement as recently was decreed.

No Final Decision

The war situation also prompted a discussion policy to be formulated to protect the seniority and rating of police and firemen called to military service. Commissioners made no final decision but expressed their desire to see that pro tem appointees get seniority credit for time served in a higher rank being reserved for a serviceman.

Commissioners accepted the resignation of Myron F. Nelson, effective February 1, and accepted also the report of Fire Chief W. P. Roble showing assignment of Capt. P. L. Clark as drillmaster

for the department, of Robert Mobley to regular captaincy and of John Stettler, jr., to pro tem captain filling a "military vacancy."

Made Official

Ellsworth L. Smith officially became assistant fire chief with the commission's announcement that he had passed the civil service examination with a near-perfect score of 103.05. Smith was the only applicant for the newly created post.

Five captains who took tests were certified to a new eligibility list for battalion chief rank, in which no vacancies now exist. They were P. L. Clark, 100.25; Paul Phillips, 96.9; Peter McCaffery, 94.7; James P. Hall, 88.1; John Stettler, sr., 85.4.

Five of eight applicants qualified for appointments as ordinary firemen when vacancies occur. They are, in eligibility order: Dick L. Craven, 84.15; Harold L. Maynard, 89; W. S. Iverson, 87.3; Melvin Hagerdorn, 83.15; Robert A. Canfield, 81.35.

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Ohio Congressman Accused of Taking Salary Kickbacks

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20—(AP)—An Ohio congressman who served in the infantry during World War I was indicted today on a charge of illegally taking political contributions from two former employees, one of them a 85-year-old widow.

He is Rep. Walter E. Brehm, 58-year-old republican, who was elected last November 7 to his fifth consecutive term in the house.

The indictment returned by a federal grand jury here accused Brehm of illegally taking \$1,380 in political contributions from two women clerks in his office during 1947 and 1948.

Returning of the indictment does not affect Brehm's tenure in congress; only house action could unseat him.

Mrs. Clara Soliday, one of those from whom Brehm is alleged to have obtained political contributions, is a 75-year-old widow. Last October 24—a few days before the election—she sued Brehm for \$17,340. She asked \$7,340 which she said the congressman had taken from her salary over a three-year period, plus \$10,000 as punitive damages.

Asks Dismissal

Rep. Brehm replied before the election with a counter suit asking dismissal of Mrs. Soliday's suit and \$5,000 damages. He contended the aged woman had brought her charges for political purposes and had caused them to be published "maliciously and falsely" in newspapers.

Through his office here, the congressman issued this statement on learning of his indictment:

"Now maybe we can get the facts on the record. This x x x is the only way I know to clear the

and bribery in war munitions dealings and was likewise released last September after serving nine months and 13 days.

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
