In his 82 games Hack was at bat 304 times, scored 37 runs, had 90 hits, 122 total bases, 19 doubles, 5 triples and 1 home run. He batted in 35 runs. Novikoff in 86 games was at bat 322 times, scored 53 runs, had 105 hits, 21 doubles, 1 triple, 12 home runs and 79 RBI's.
